Reflections with Pastor Scott

GROWING GRATITUDE IN THE GARDEN



As November is upon us, a traditional season of thankfulness, I was thinking about all the things I have to be thankful for in the many areas of my life. It's a regular practice a friend encouraged me to engage when going through a rough patch. It can be doubly hard to give thanks when so much around a person seems out of control and can move a person's mood to anything but thankfulness. As I was reflecting on thanksgiving amidst a tension filled world, I came across this reflection by Lisa DeRosa from my October 6, 2021 Godspace daily devotional I receive. Lisa had done everything one needs to do to have the perfect garden. She even got a pair of overalls for good garden vibes. Despite doing everything "right" and believing she was in control, the garden appeared to be a total flop. She writes the following.

While despairing over my gardening woes, I found comfort in scripture:

*"Though the cherry trees don't blossom
and the strawberries don't ripen
Though the apples are worm-eaten
And the wheat fields stunted,
Though the sheep pens are sheepless
And the cattle barns empty,
I'm singing joyful praise to God."
—Habakkuk 3:17-19 (MSG)*

I still think a little garden-grumbling was valid. I'm not a fan of toxic positivity and believe in the importance of expressing our frustrations and emotions, lest they build up. And ... this reminder from Habakkuk gave me an opportunity to praise God for the many things that went well with my garden—with or without a tangible reward in hand.

For instance, there was the warm sun on my face all season long, the smell and feel of dirt on my hands, and the blessings of being outside. There were master gardeners and other green thumbs God has placed in my life, who were a pleasure to consult with and depend upon (when depending on others is a growth area for me). What about the rodents, bugs, and birds I inadvertently fed? I enjoy their company year-round ... is it really so bad to share some of the summer harvest with them?

Didn't God design them to be foragers, and aren't I asked to be a steward of the earth and all living things? When I paused to reframe the situation through a lens of gratitude and praise, I didn't feel that all was lost. In fact, had I thought I had it all under my complete control, I may not have even noticed such a bounty of blessings. How sad that would be—like my tomatillos, my own display of stunted growth.

In what areas of your life are you sensing a lack of control right now? What blessings can you root out when you let go of your own expectations and look for the gifts God is giving in the situation? How might you praise God?

The Bishop's Article from the November 2021 Edition of The Spirit



What is Our Purpose?

The ELCA's Statement of Purpose is found in every congregation constitution, every synod constitution and in the ELCA Constitution. In the ELCA Constitution (4.01) we read: "The Church is a people created by God in Christ, empowered by

the Holy Spirit, called and sent to bear witness to God's creative, redeeming, and sanctifying activity in the world." This same Statement of Purpose is found in the NWWA Synod Constitution S6.01 and in the Model Constitution for Congregations C4.01. I encourage you to read ELCA's entire Statement of Purpose. It is beautiful and energizing. (Find the constitutions here: <https://www.lutheransnw.org/resources/constitutions>)

When I read the Statement of Purpose, it helps me remember who and whose I am and what I am called to do and to be. You see, sometimes we forget. Sometimes we forget what it means to be children of God, redeemed by Christ, and sent into the world. Sometimes we get caught up in finances or building maintenance, we get lost in petty disagreements and who should do what and so many other things, that we forget that we are created, empowered, called, and sent by God – by GOD – to live into and to share what God is already doing in the world – in God's creative, redeeming, and sanctifying work in and for the world.

How do we live into this Statement of Purpose? Below I propose three ways that we can (there are many more but I only have so much space).

Relationship: There are so many people in this world who are lonely, who are discouraged, who are anxious, who are tired. There are so many who feel unloved, unwelcomed, unwanted. They are living in your neighborhood, they are shopping at your grocery store, they have kids in school with your kids or grandkids, they are walking by your church every day. They are looking for relationship and for friendship. In a 2019 survey by CIGNA, 61% of working people identified as lonely. Did you catch that? Over half of people who are working are lonely. And this survey was taken before the pandemic. I can only surmise that the number is higher after 18 months of COVID life. Other studies I have read state that loneliness and isolation lead to physical and emotional difficulties as

well as societal polarization. This is obviously a problem in this country. So, how do we have deep meaningful conversations so that people feel welcome and heard? Have connection and deep friendship? How does this fit with our Statement of Purpose?

Impact: There are so many people in this world who are looking to do something meaningful, to change the world for the better. There are so many people who wonder how they can make a difference, how they can positively influence their communities locally, nationally, and globally. These people are living in your neighborhood, they are shopping at your grocery store, they have kids in school with your kids or grandkids, they are walking by your church every day. They are looking for impact in this world. How can they be our partners in the ministries we are already doing and in the ministries they are doing? How can we listen to them to hear what other ideas might come through the Holy Spirit working in them and through their innovation? What partners do we need to multiply the impact of your ministry site in your neighborhood? How does this fit with our Statement of Purpose?

Transformation: There are so many people in this world who are looking for transformation, for new life, for a new path. There are so many people who have lost hope in institutions, in the church, in their lives. These people are living in your neighborhood, they are shopping at your grocery store, they have kids in school with your kids or grandkids, they are walking by your church every day. They are looking for resurrection. How is your ministry site set up to not only welcome those searching, but honoring who they are? How do they know that their story is welcome? How is the good news shared with those who have never heard it and are desperate to hear? How does this fit with our Statement of Purpose?

I invite you to look at ELCA's Statement of Purpose – or your own congregation Statement of Purpose and discuss in your councils, Adult Forums, small groups, and elsewhere. What other questions or thoughts come out of what you read?

Together may we live drenched in God's love and sent out to share the Good News. For we are created, redeemed, called, and sent to live into and share in God's creative, redeeming, and sanctifying activity in the world.

Dear Friends,

On behalf of the staff of Doctors Without Borders/Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF), I want to thank you for your generous gift of \$720.00 received on August 26, 2021.

Your contribution helps ensure that our patients receive the care they so urgently need, no matter their circumstances. In the last few months alone, support from caring donors like you has helped us respond to a range of emergencies in more than 70 countries, including:

- **Measles Emergency in Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC):** Since December 2020, we've vaccinated 70,000 children in South Ubangi province. We have also supported eight health centers, helping more than 1,200 patients since mid-February 2021.
- **COVID-19 Crisis in Brazil:** Since April 2020, hundreds of our staff have been involved in our COVID-19 response in Brazil. We have worked in several Brazilian states, supporting overwhelmed local health systems, providing training in infection prevention and control and mental health support.
- **Ensuring Medical Services in Myanmar:** At the onset of the recent military coup, we prepared an emergency team to act as soon as the need arose if medical demands overwhelmed hospitals' capacity to respond. We have donated medical supplies and first aid kits to hospitals and are working to ensure that patients with HIV continue to receive care and medication refills.

Our critical work to deliver emergency care to people caught in these crises wouldn't be possible without your generous support. Thank you for being part of our important lifesaving mission.

Rajendra Kushwaha and his wife Nikky Devi used to have a hard time sleeping, as they feared they'd be woken in the night by rising floodwaters that would wash away their home, gardens and livestock. It had happened several times before — the river near their home in India would swell without warning and sweep everything away, leaving their family vulnerable to hunger.

But your kindness reached them on the banks of the river. For them, your love sounds like an announcement made through a tiny megaphone, letting them know a flood is coming. This early warning system urges their entire village to take their livestock and valuables to higher ground well before the floodwaters arrive. Your love is also teaching them new farming techniques — like growing food on rooftops or in hanging baskets — so their vital crops don't wash away. Now Rajendra, Nikky and their children can rest easier at night, knowing their crops and futures are more secure.

BENEVOLENCE OF THE MONTH November 2021

Community Resource Center of Stanwood Camano

The Community Resource Center of Stanwood Camano - our benevolence of the month - is pleased to welcome Mary Brederick as the new Executive Director. Mary, the former director of the Stanwood YMCA, brings a wealth of experience and a commitment to our local community to the position. Coming to CRC in the midst of the COVID outbreak, she writes, "The pandemic has really provided us the opportunity to engage with the community in new and different ways, while also allowing us to stay true to our roots of providing a safety net to those most vulnerable in our local Stanwood-Camano neighborhoods. Since January 2021, your Community Resource Center has supported nearly 500 individuals/families with emergency assistance. These funds helped families stay housed through rental assistance, kept lights/heat/internet available through utilities support, and enabled essential service workers to get to their jobs via bus/gas vouchers. In essence, we have been here to help families navigate services that we directly provide and/or help them to find services through our partnering agencies.

As we look at the remaining months of 2021, we are excited to welcome folks back to activities: we saw 60 families at our re-opening barbeque in June, 40 families at our Teddy Bear Picnic in July, 20 youth participants in Teen Activities throughout August, and this month we are excited to open our doors to the Stanwood Rotary Club, AA Support Group, Ed Wiley Autism Acceptance Library and the Aktion Club. Additionally, we are looking forward to the re-opening of our Bookstore (fingers crossed for Oct.), additional youth and family related programming, continued collaboration with our local non-profit partners, and expansion of our educational workshops and outreach programs, including mental well-being support."



AFGHAN REFUGEE CRISIS

A close friend and colleague once described the plight of refugees as, "While immigrants as often drawn to America by the opportunities offered by our great nation, refugees are pushed to this country through war, trauma and loss." Lutheran Community Services Northwest welcomes refugees and provides assistance to help them successfully transition to this country. Salah Ansary, Regional Director for Lutheran Community Services Northwest, has led programming to serve refugees throughout the Northwest. Salah was a refugee who came to America from Afghanistan as a young man, having both personal and professional expertise. For over 40 years, Washington State has been a leader in refugee resettlement and LCSNW has been a significant partner in those efforts. In a recent briefing on Afghan resettlement, Governor Jay Inslee noted that we expect about 37,000 refugees to be resettled in Washington State. LCSNW is already preparing to receive these families and Salah will share what to expect and how we can help. Join us Sunday, November 7th at 7 pm for an educational opportunity to learn more. -Janet St. Clair


