Churches get creative ahead of another Easter with COVID

on't expect crowded pews, singing with a choir or many traditional egg hunts this weekend. Though places of

worship can now have more people at gatherings with the recent move to Phase 3 of the state's reopening plan, local church leaders plan to host COVID-safe Easter services and events this Sunday.

Don Allen, parish administrator at St. Cecilia Catholic Church in Stanwood, said safety protocols, such as social distancing and masks, remain very important.

"At 50% capacity we could have 250 people," Allen said. "However, with every other pew roped off so that we can maintain a separation of 6 feet, we max out at 130 in the church. Fortunately, we are able to have overflow attendance in our gathering space."

Other churches, like St. Aidan's on

Camano Island, are sticking with online services only.

"We are taking a slow and cautious approach in returning to in-person services," the Rev. Drew Foisie of St. Aidan's said. "We are planning no changes over the Easter weekend and will continue to stream our live 10 a.m. Sunday service on Facebook."

Our Saviour's Lutheran Church in Stanwood and Camano Lutheran Church will continue to offer outdoor services with no changes for Easter Sunday.

"Members who attend our drive-in service on Easter may bring chairs if they prefer to sit outside of their vehicles," the Rev. Scott Brents of Camano Lutheran said. "Flowers are also welcome."

Reflections with Pastor Scott



"But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you. So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for the were terrified." Mark 16:7-8

Alleluia! Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed. Alleluia! Easter is finally here, and we finally get to say these words after a long Lenten season. A Lenten season that to some feels far longer than 40 days but reflects the last year as a whole.

Now that easter has arrived, what do we do? On that first easter when the women arrived at the tomb their world was thrown upside down once again. Jesus was not in the tomb and instead there was a young man dressed in a white robe who told them, "He has been raised...But go, tell his disciples and Peter..." Did they go and tell Peter and the disciples? According to the end of our easter reading, "they said nothing to anyone, for they were terrified." The end! The end of the good news of Jesus Christ crucified and risen according to this section believed to be the originally ending of Mark's gospel. Well, apparently not. As we read further along in Mark 16 and in the other gospel renderings of Jesus resurrection, they did go and tell.

When terror hits us and we are afraid, we often go silent for various reasons. We Lutherans have struggled with being silent over the years about sharing our faith in Christ for several reasons. I don't want to offend anyone. I don't have all the answers. I don't know enough, etc... The list is long. However, if we remain silent, who hears the good news? Had these women at the tomb remained silent in their terror, would we know the story and be here shouting, "Alleluia! Christ is risen!" throughout the easter season and beyond?

In our fear of a virus coming into our lives over a year ago, it would have been easy to shut down and say nothing, but we didn't. Oh, some claimed "they" were keeping us from worshiping, but that was never the case. We continued to worship together, but in new ways. The good news of the crucified and risen Christ was never silenced. Like the new reality of worship that earliest group of Christians engaged, we too engaged new ways of worship. Interestingly enough, those new ways actually connected with more people than had heard the Gospel before. Alleluia! Christ is risen!

So now as we start to move into new realities yet to be discovered on how we are church together, how will we respond to those words, "Go and tell..."? What might that look like? Will fear keep us from recognizing it or will "Alleluia! Christ is risen" lead us? By trusting in the transforming power of the resurrected Christ I believe we will say with words, actions, heart soul and mind, "Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!"

The Bishop's Article from the April 2021 edition of The Spirit

There is a cave in Kentucky called Mammoth Cave. When you first enter, it appears quite empty of life. Dark, quiet, dank, barren.

And yet ... and yet ...

Like many caves, first impressions can be deceiving. You see, over 200 animals live in Mammoth Cave. Animals that range from raccoons and other small creatures who accidentally venture into the cave and cannot figure out how to return to the outside, to animals who deliberately live both inside and outside of the cave, to forty-two species of troglobites - animals adapted exclusively to life in the darkness. *Amid seeming emptiness, life is abundant.*

If one were to drive by most of our church buildings, parking lots would be empty and the doors would be locked. A casual observer might say, "That church is empty. Nothing is happening there."

And yet ... and yet ...

First impressions can be deceiving. There is a lot of life happening in congregations and ministry sites. There are people who have joined communities of faith in our synod that, for various reasons, would never have entered the doors of a church building. They have become part of the community through online worship – even if they live thousands of miles away. There are people who were a part of the church community for years – but because of work schedules or health issues or mobility concerns – they had faded away. Now they are coming each week as they re-connect. And there are people who have never left. They continue to foster relationships, enjoy serving in the community of the church, and who are faithful to the tasks that are required to keep churches functioning.

We have groups in many churches that are working with other organizations to help feed, clothe, teach, and be with people in the neighborhoods. We have those who are having sometimes uncomfortable (but always fruitful) conversations about what it means to be faithful in this time and place. We have many who are visiting and calling the sick and the dispirited.

Fundamentally, together we are living into the good news of Jesus and journeying together in the Spirit as we are Church in the world. *Amid seeming emptiness, life is abundant.*





Listen to these words from the first Easter, "Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him!' (John 20:1-2)

Mary looked into that tomb and saw only lifelessness and she despaired. She peered into the shadows and felt, deep in her bones, the darkness of sorrow, abandonment, disappointment, grief, heartache, and pain. She had gone searching for something, someone, and she came away with nothing.

And yet ... and yet ...

Jesus had risen. Jesus, scars and all, was going to meet her in the garden. In a few hours Jesus would call Mary's name and assure her of his love. Jesus would come to the disciples and breathe on them – giving them peace and asking them to, "Feed his sheep." And they would. *Amid seeming emptiness, life is abundant.*

Dear Beloveds, this last year has felt somewhat like we were living in a cave. We have been confined, somewhat lost, weary, and wondering where the new life is. We have stumbled on rocks and fallen in despair.

And yet ... and yet ...

We trust that soon we will be gathering in-person together. Soon we will be beyond this pandemic. Soon life will not "return to normal" but instead will move forward as we live God's calling of loving God and loving neighbor.

We know this because we are a resurrection people. Out of death comes life. We place our trust in our risen Savior who died and is raised again. *Amid seeming emptiness, life is abundant in Christ Jesus our risen Savior.*

And we all proclaim: Alleluia! Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed! + Bishop Shelley Bryan Wee

2020 IRS Tax Update

The IRS has made it permanent that those age 70-1/2 and older can contribute funds directly from their IRA to a 501(c)3 organization (of which CLC is one).



In doing so, this amount is not reported as part of your taxable income on your tax return, but cannot be taken as a charitable deduction if itemizing expenses. However, with the change in the tax laws in 2019, the standard deduction has become so high (\$14,050 if age 65 or over and filing single and \$27,400 if filing jointly in 2020) that very few taxpayers now itemize and as the contribution from an IRA is not reported as taxable income, this can be a significant tax advantage. Thus, donors can make a gift in 2021 any time of the year. You can donate what might be your total "pledge" at one time for 2021 and Teresa will prorate the donation monthly over the year. Most IRA Trustees will transfer funds on a regular schedule – i.e. monthly, quarterly or semi-annually, if so directed.

Secondly, for 2020 only, taxpayers who do not itemize and use the standard deduction, can deduct \$300 in cash charitable contributions from taxable income. This also reduces federal taxes payable. This deduction is a maximum of \$300 per tax return, regardless of filing status (single or joint), and must be paid in cash and not from an IRA. It seems likely that some version of this will be passed for 2021 tax returns due to the ongoing pandemic.

Lastly, donation of appreciated common stock is still a good option. If highly appreciated stock is donated, and the donor is itemizing expenses, the donor can deduct the market value of the stock at the time of donation. The donor does not have to claim the amount of the capital gain on their tax return that would have been realized if the stock were sold and the funds donated. If this option is chosen, Teresa should be contacted in advance to give the donor the instructions for having the stock deposited to the Church's brokerage account and to let her know when the transfer has been made. She will immediately sell the stock with the funds deposited as the donor directs (i.e. general fund, building fund, specific benevolences.) The donor is responsible for determining the value of the gift. CLC will only report the description of the stock and number of shares to the donor.

Total charitable donations from an IRA are limited to \$100,000. John Selle has reported that his tax advisor recommends donating to Camano Lutheran Church directly from his IRA. It not only reduces his income tax payable but also provides incentive for making a larger donation.


