Reflections with Pastor Scott

Psalm 100: A Psalm of Thanksgiving.

¹ Make a joyful noise to the LORD, all the earth. ² Serve the LORD with gladness; come into his presence with singing. ³ Know that the LORD is God. It is he who made us, and we are his;^[a] we are his people and the sheep of his pasture. ⁴ Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise. Give thanks to him; bless his name ⁵ For the LORD is good; his steadfast love endures forever and his faithfulness to all generations.



This time of year naturally turns our hearts toward gratitude—toward reflecting on the many blessings that surround us. Psalm 100 reminds me of how I often feel when I come into worship here at CLC and think about this community of faith. I am deeply thankful for the people, the gifts, and the ministries we share together—living out our mission of "serving neighbor near and far."

I give thanks for the gift of worship—each Sunday, during midweek gatherings, and in special services like the Conference Worship we celebrated in October. I'm grateful for all who make these moments possible: our musicians, sound technicians, ushers, readers, worship assistants, those who prepare the alter and care for the worship space, those who host coffee hour, our staff who coordinate details, our Worship and Music Ministry Team, and each of you who lift your hearts and voices in praise.

I'm thankful for our many caregiving ministries, near and far—the Care Team, card ministry, in home communion, prayer shawl ministry, quilters, and those who assemble care kits, and for our renewed Fellowship Ministry team bringing us together in a world so often filled with isolation. I'm grateful for our hospitality teams who serve during funerals and weddings, and for your generous responses to special needs—whether through disaster relief, Socktoberfest, or simple everyday acts of compassion toward one another.

I'm thankful for our education ministries—from Sunday morning learning to the LiVE Project opportunities through the synod. Our Sunday School and *Godly Play* have begun again, offering our children a space to grow in faith. I'm grateful for our confirmation students and youth gatherings, and for our Childcare Center, which continues to extend love, learning, and care beyond our walls to children and families in the community.

I'm thankful for our Stewardship Ministry Team, Benevolence Mission Team, and Council, who faithfully oversee the resources entrusted to us. Each year, CLC gives between 10% and 15% of its income beyond itself to support ministries in our community and around the world—efforts that address homelessness, housing, shelter, and community connection amid isolation. These include support for Lutherwood Outdoor Ministry, LINCNW, and other partners offering shelter, food, and medical care.

I'm thankful that our buildings serve as a blessing to the community—a place where lives are supported, renewed, and even saved. Groups like AA, NA, Al-Anon, Scouts, and the Red Cross emergency shelter find welcome and refuge here.

I'm also grateful for our Property Ministry Team, who care for our large and aging campus with great dedication, and for all of you who quietly tend to the many small details that keep our shared life vibrant and beautiful.

Whenever I try to list all that I'm thankful for, I inevitably miss something—not because it's unimportant, but because the blessings are simply too many to name.

I share all of this to express how deeply thankful I am for you—for CLC and the many ways God's Spirit is at work among us. When you share your hard-earned money, your time, or your talents, these are some of the ministries and moments you help make possible.

Thank you for continuing this journey of faith and gratitude together.

From the Bishop:

Dear Beloveds,

Across our country, people are struggling – financially, emotionally, spiritually. Division, violence, and uncertainty are paramount. We are living in a time when the weight of the world feels heavier than most of us can bear. Families are being torn apart, communities are threatened, and political leaders are trading compassion for power. Every day seems more chaotic and unmoored than the day before. For many, fear has become a daily companion. We might cry, along with the psalmist in Psalm 13, "How long, O Lord? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me? How long must I bear pain in my soul and have sorrow in my heart all day long? How long shall my enemy be exalted over me?"

[Pause here. For we must acknowledge the pain that is happening within us and around us. Pause. This might be a long, long pause.] ... Now let us take a deep breath. Now let us move forward.

After we have named the deep wounds within us and across this nation; after we have confessed our grief, our weariness, and our complicity in the broken systems that bind us; after we have allowed the truth to settle in, let us remember that this is not the end of the story. As people of faith, we don't stop at despair and fear. We don't close our eyes or turn inward or try to protect ourselves from more pain. No. Instead we open our eyes, turn outward, and we rise to follow Jesus once more – into the very places and spaces where pain still lingers and where love is most needed.

How do we do this? As people saved by grace through Jesus, how do look outward and love our neighbor? Here are some ideas from a letter (https://www.lutheransnw.org/news/letter-from-elca-bishops) signed by many of the bishops that was published in October 2025. These ideas include:

- Pray for those who are vulnerable and for all who work for justice.
- Advocate in your communities, legislatures, and Congress for laws that protect migrants, advance racial justice, and safeguard LGBTQIA+ people.
- Engage in the holy work of hospitality, creating spaces of safety, affirmation, and belonging for all of God's children.
- Model respectful dialogue in a polarized world, seeking understanding rooted in love.
- Hold fast to hope, trusting that the Spirit is still at work renewing creation and reconciling the world to God.

As a guide to this holy work, I have always loved the story of Martin Luther who, when the plague was raging in Wittenberg, chose to stay in order to care for the sick and comfort the dying. We might sometimes think of Luther as curmudgeonly and argumentative. We might also think he was more concerned with being saved by grace through faith than loving his neighbor. But Luther's courage and pastoral care during the plague shows his heart and his response to God's amazing grace. For during the plague, as people were dying around him, he stayed and cared and ministered. In 1527 he wrote, "We are bound to each other in such a way that no one may forsake the other in his distress but is obliged to assist and help him as he himself would like to be helped." ("Whether One May Flee from a Deadly Plague")

Above all things, let us not grow weary. Let us continue to hear the summons of Jesus. Let us continue to answer the call to love our neighbor – especially the most vulnerable. And, may we be the ones who, in a weary world, hope as the psalmist hopes at the end of Psalm 13: "But I trusted in your steadfast love; my heart shall rejoice in your salvation. I will sing to the Lord because God has dealt bountifully with me."

Faith. Belief. Confidence. Conviction. Certainty. Assurance. These are all words that we tend to use almost synonymously for things we have strong, usually positive feelings about. Often we think of these terms as the opposite of doubt or questioning. When I saw that the LiVE Project was offering a class called Practicing Faith Beyond Certainty, I was intrigued. The overall purpose of the class is to reimagine faith as courage, curiosity,

and compassion. The first session (and, full disclosure, as I write this, we are only three sessions in) was titled "When Certainty Gets in the Way." I imagine for some people, especially those raised in a more dogmatic form of Christianity, the idea that certainty can get in the way of faith might be shocking. My spouse, for example, was raised in such a church and he continues to shake his head when he hears me talking about questions we wrestle with in our Lutheran congregations. It is as if being uncertain equates with less faith. For me, though, the notion that certainty can be a stumbling block to faith really resonates.

I've always been a questioner. I was the kid in Sunday School who asked the teacher how Adam could have named the dinosaurs when they died out before people existed. One of the things that I appreciate about being Lutheran is that we are always being made new and we support education and learning. When our understanding of the world changes, we try to change with the new knowledge. Our policies and social statements evolve as we have new information upon which to base them. I am comfortable changing my mind about something when there is new information to show that I may have been wrong. As the American philosopher Ralph Waldo Emerson suggests, to do otherwise is to harbor a foolish consistency. That is why I am a bit skeptical of certainty. Being too certain about something limits the imagination. A comedian that I follow on social media, Trae Crowder, does a bit where he claims he is envious of "dumb" (his term, not mine) people because they are so confident in their beliefs. They are super certain - no doubt about it. I would say that is the difference between incurious and curious people. Incurious folks stop looking for more complex meaning. In this way certainty, for me, stops me from learning and growing and becoming more faithful.

Session 3 of the LiVE class, "From Predictable Certainty to Open Curiosity" addressed this, as well. Being openly curious in the church can sometimes also take courage. We want to believe that our leaders, who have trained and studied and prepared for their roles, know the answers. It is easier to just believe what they tell us. When I was in teacher training forty-ish years ago, it was not uncommon to be told I should never admit I was wrong or that I didn't know something. Students, I was told, want to believe their teachers are infallible experts. I expect some pastors and deacons were told that, as well. And yet, I could never be that kind of teacher. I wanted my students to know that I was human and fallible and that I was able to learn from my mistakes. I had no problem saying, "I don't know," but I also followed that up with, "how can we find out?" Jesus didn't expect his followers to be faithful beyond any doubt. They asked questions. They made false assumptions. Peter even let his fear overcome his faith to the point of denying even knowing Jesus and yet he was the rock upon which our church was built. I know my faith journey is just that, a journey. Sometimes I am on a clearly marked path. Sometimes I am bushwhacking through brambles. Sometimes I don't even know what direction I'm going in. The thing about faith though, is that it is also the assurance of things hoped for and not yet realized. I'm going to keep on hoping and moving forward with curiosity, courage, and compassion.

Here's what I or the council have been up to in October:

- LiVE Project: Faith Beyond Certainty (I have followed asynchronously)
- Living Hope Lutheran Church Class: "What does it mean to be a Christian against Christian Nationalism?" I have attended this series offered at my home congregation.
- Synod Executive Committee: We met on October 9. Among other agenda items, we approved a lease between Luther's Table and the Synod.
- Synod Policy Review Committee: We met on October 15th. Among other agenda items, we reviewed the Policy for Negotiated Resignations.
- Equity Team: I have continued having one-with-one conversations with leaders throughout the synod.

Financial Update - Camano Lutheran Church

Members and friends of Camano Lutheran Church,

As Philippians 4:19 reminds us "And my God will meet all your needs according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus." When the congregation approved our spending guidelines for 2025, we anticipated that giving would overcome the discrepancy between our expenses and planned giving. We approved a spending guideline with \$296,600 in income and \$330,693 in expenses; which meant we were going into the year with a \$34,093 deficit in our spending guidelines.

As highlighted in the August Dove, we have been struggling to receive enough money to cover our monthly expenses. Our leaders have continued to monitor the situation and manage our expenses. Through September, we have remained within our overall guidelines for expenses while our giving continues to be even below our original anticipated income. We are currently showing a deficit of \$41,900 through September. See details below.

Due to the continued deficit, our council had to make difficult choices in August ensuring we didn't spend into our unrestricted funds (which we strive to maintain at a 2-month operating expense amount). At the end of August we had approximately \$23,000 in unrestricted funds. This was still below our average monthly operating expenses which are approximately \$27,000 per month.

The Council defines our "operating expenses" as those costs associated with keeping the doors open, the lights on, the basic supplies needed, and the current staff to maintain our existing ministries at their current levels.

On a brighter note, the Childcare has continued to grow and flourish in this important ministry of Camano Lutheran. This has also reflected in the growth of their savings even after 2 pay raises to the staff and other improvements of the facility this year. They had accumulated over \$300,000 in savings by the end of August.

Financial Update - Camano Lutheran Church

After mindful discussions over the last two months, the Church Council approved three major motions:

- The transfer of \$60,000 from the Childcare savings to the Church's unrestricted operating funds to restore our unrestricted operating funds, providing that two-month cushion. The hope is that this will allow the church to continue operating in the black for the remainder of the year.
- The transfer of \$75,000 from the Childcare savings into a 1-yr fixed CD under the Church's account, identified as unrestricted funds in order to earn interest and provide an additional source of unrestricted funds to be utilized as approved by Council.
- The transfer of \$65,000 from the Childcare savings into an account and designated for the water system improvements needed and required by the state. The issue was first communicated from the Property Ministry Team in the May 2024 Dove.

As we are all doing the ministries of the church, the money from the Childcare will help with the continued operation of the overall church for the remainder of the year and provide an avenue to upgrade our water system. We are stronger together!

From the Council, we want to provide a few things to ponder and reflect on as we come to the time of year for reviewing and approving our spending guidelines for next year:

- Operating expenses continue to increase for the church and its ministries (insurance, required inspections, utilities, supplies, phone/internet, etc.) just like all of our own household expenses.
- Wages and applicable taxes continue to increase and we want to ensure all of our employees are paid enough to support themselves and their families.
- The number of family units giving has decreased over the last few years.
- When funds are designated to a specific ministry of our church, those funds must be tracked separately and can NOT be used for general operating expenses.
- For those giving through automatic withdrawals, when was the last time you reviewed your giving amount?
- If our giving does not increase enough to cover monthly operating expenses, then drastic measures will need to be discussed.

We ask the congregation to look at how you can continue to help in maintaining the structural presence of our historical church and most importantly, carrying out our mission and reaching out to our community.

BENEVOLENCE OF THE MONTH

November 2025

STANWOOD CAMANO FOOD BANK

Have you driven on 102nd Ave NW in Stanwood lately?? That's the road north out of town towards Conway (Old Pacific Highway). If you happen to drive it on a Wednesday or Friday, you might have noticed a line of people on the west side of the road. They were some of the approximately 400 people (family units) who come to the Stanwood Camano Food Bank each week. They can sign-up for a time slot, but there still always seems to be a line. The distribution system is set up like a grocery store, where they can choose what they need, with limits based on family size. As well as food, there are personal hygiene items, baby diapers and possible other miscellaneous items. If this source of food was not available, where would all these people get enough to feed their families? That is a good question.

Where does this food come from?

Individual donations and food drives.

Grocery store and farm contributions.

Purchased by the Food Bank with money from personal donations and sales from the associated Thrift store (located in Stanwood, across from the Food Bank).

Distribution to clients is now on Wednesdays from 3-7 and Fridays from 11–3. Before donated food items can be put on the shelf for distribution, they must first be sorted and inspected to verify viability. Lots of the items donated by grocery stores are near (hopefully not beyond) their "use by dates" and must be checked by volunteers. Also, fresh produce must be checked and sorted.

How can you help?

- <u>Food donations</u> can be brought to the Food Bank.
 They also have a "Simple Gesture Program" (which has about 500 participants at this time), where:
- (1) Food Bank volunteers will bring green bags to your doorstep. It comes with a list of most needed items.
- (2) You put food items to donate in the bags.
- (3) Volunteers pick up the bags every other month & bring them to the Food Bank.
- Money donations allow the purchase of specific items that might be in short supply and allow buying in bulk or on sale.
- <u>Volunteers are always needed</u>. Whether you can work a few hours one day a week, or several days a week, you are always welcome.

Our prayers were that we would be led to new avenues of serving our community & children.



After worship on October 12, 2 members from St. Aidans met with a small group and provided information on the Camano Island/Snohomish area Cold Weather Shelter (CWS) which was started in conjunction with Stanwood Camano Resource Center in 2023. Start-up supplies were donated from Island County & Stanwood Camano Food Bank. Donated laundry services are provided by Arlington Laundry Station. They can host 12 guests. Pets are welcome. Last winter season the shelter was open 27 nights serving 11 guests and 3 animals. 15 volunteers from St. Aidan's and 8 from Stanwood-Camano Volunteers. To continue to be successful they need more volunteers. The CWS runs from 7 pm to 7 am, divided into 2 shifts, 6:45 pm to 1:15 am and 1 am to 7:15 am. A minimum of two people are needed per shift, three would be ideal. One person from St. Aidan's will be present. The vision and hope for the CWS is to become a community focused service.
