Reflections with Pastor Scott

Sabbatical 2026



On the one hand, it is hard to believe it has been seven years since I returned from the sabbatical time we last shared together. On the other hand, journeying through covid and coming out of it, the realities of loss and challenges we faced during that period and afterward and navigating an increasingly divided society have made it feel double that time in some ways. As part of my letter of call, I am due a sabbatical at each six-year mark of my time here at CLC. I did not take it in the sixth year this time because we were facing several significant realities as a congregation.

Our preschool was closing. We experienced a change in our Childcare Director. The new director was here for a couple of months before beginning maternity leave and later decided to remain home as a stay-at-home mom. That meant we needed to find a new director while also helping train and support the staff during the interim. Our church council was still relatively new and navigating some challenges as well, and it is important to have solid leadership in place during a sabbatical. There were several other things happening too, but I'm guessing you see the picture. It simply made more sense to wait one more year.

For those who were not part of CLC during the previous sabbatical, a little history may be helpful. During that first sabbatical at the seven-year mark, we received a one-time grant from the Lilly Foundation. The grant covered the entire sabbatical. It paid for my time away, the cost of fill-in clergy for the congregation, emergency pastoral coverage, and both a sending and returning service with a fully catered meal so no one in the congregation had to do any work for those events.

As mentioned above, the Lilly grant is only offered once. For all future sabbaticals, CLC has set aside funds to cover the cost. Those funds will support this upcoming three-month sabbatical, which will take place in August, September, and October of 2026. In other words, all the funds necessary to cover the sabbatical are planned for and set aside.

We will also be forming a sabbatical team that will help shape the theme of this time for both myself and the congregation. One of the things I appreciated most about the Lilly grant process was the understanding that a sabbatical is not only renewal for the pastor but also renewal for the congregation. In many ways, the sabbatical is a journey we take apart, but also together.

In the next couple of Dove articles, I will share more about what a sabbatical is and why it is offered, what the theme for this time of renewal will be, and how things will work while I am away. In the meantime, please feel free to ask me any questions you may have about the sabbatical.

I am deeply thankful for your thoughtfulness, generosity, and willingness to make this part of my call in serving this faith community at CLC.

From the Bishop:

April 2026

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. John 20:1

When I ask people how they are, so often they say, “Well, I’m doing ok considering ...”

Sometimes they confess to me that the world just feels so dark right now.

And I get it – I can feel this way, too. Sometimes it does seem the shadows are gathering around us and just getting scarier and more menacing and it is hard to see a path forward.

But then I am reminded of the gift of darkness.

Recently I read Conor Knighton’s book *Leave Only Footprints* where he talks about visiting all the national parks in a year. One of the most captivating chapters was about national parks that have been certified as Dark Sky Places. He describes areas where light pollution is carefully limited so people can experience the night sky as humans did for most of history. Standing in one of these places, the sky can be overwhelming. Stars multiply as your eyes adjust. Constellations sharpen. The universe stretches above you in breathtaking clarity. Conor says that what surprises many visitors is this: the darkness does not feel frightening. It feels beautiful. Everyone is standing shoulder to shoulder – strangers to one another in the daylight – but at night, all eyes are lifted to the heavens in wonder experiencing something extraordinary.

In these particular times that we are living in, this brings me hope. For in the light of day war is happening and people are dying and there is shouting on all sides and beliefs seem intransigent and we experience and participate in the hatred and greed and selfishness and bigotry that is everywhere around us. We see our enemy. We identify our enemy. We classify our enemy. The light shines harshly.

But in the darkness of night, we gather together. In the darkness of night, we huddle close. In the darkness of night, we sigh with wonder at the beauty and majesty of the heavens. In the darkness of night, we no longer can tell who our enemy is. And, while this could be scary, this is also liberating. For we remember the beginning of the story of God and creation – that for God darkness is not chaos beyond God’s reach – it is the very place where God begins midwifing new hope, new promise, new life – in spite of what happens in the light of day.

We experience this promise in the Easter story. (Let me remind you, the resurrection did not occur at sunrise even though many of us have attended a lot of sunrise services!). For even as Mary Magdalene started hurrying towards the tomb before dawn, the resurrection had miraculously already happened. The tomb was already empty. Jesus Christ was alive! For as we read in scripture, life was rising before the dawn. This is the strange and beautiful truth at the heart of our faith - and truly at the heart of the gospel. The power of death was broken even before the sun began to shine.

This is the hope of Easter. Even when the world feels uncertain, even when grief and fear weigh heavily on our hearts, even when the shadows fall, God is at work beneath the surface of things. Life is stirring. Hope is rising.

Go find a place of darkness. And there you will see God.



From the VEEP:

“To love him with all the heart and with all the understanding and with all the strength and to love one’s neighbor as oneself—this is much more important than all whole burnt offerings and sacrifices.” (Mark 12:33)

I love my children. I really, really, really love my children. And here is the miraculous part: they didn’t have to do anything but exist for me to love them. I loved them from the time I felt them move inside me. I loved them more when I held them for the first time. I have loved them through all the ups and downs of childhood, adolescence, and now adulthood. Now, I happen to think they are pretty nice people, and they have each done many commendable things in their lives, but I do not love them because of those actions. I love them because they are. This is grace. This is what it means for us to be loved by God. God doesn’t need our works to love us. We don’t have to be valedictorians; we don’t have to be rich; we don’t have to be athletic champions; we don’t have to be inventors or legislators or judges or doctors. We just have to be.

This is the best way I know to explain the Lutheran notion of being saved by grace through faith. We claim that nothing we can do can separate us from God’s love. We do not come to God through our efforts, but God comes to us in God’s infinite love. God loves us because we are. That doesn’t mean that we shouldn’t also do good works that God wants us to do. My children were pretty good about doing their chores. They did their homework. They treated each other well. They behaved in such a way as to let me know they loved me back. That is what we do with God. Because God loves us so much, we love God back by loving kindness and doing justice in the world. Because God loves us, we show that we love our siblings by treating them well. We do our chores not to earn God’s love, but to return it.

But, some might say, what if your children weren’t nice people? What if they didn’t do their chores or treat each other kindly? What if they hurt others? What if they hurt you? Would you still love them? I would like to believe that I would. I might not like their actions very much and I might even fear them, but I think I would still love them. Likewise, I know there are some parents who do not love their children. Some people just don’t have that emotional capacity. Humans are fallible. We don’t always love perfectly, nor do we act purely. My analogy is imperfect because humans are. That is why we fall back on some kind of transactional relationship with God - we expect God to act like us. God, however, is not fallible. God’s love is perfect and abundant and therefore we CAN be saved by grace through faith and not through our good works. We CAN do good works as a way of loving God back. Grace is Amazing that way.

So, as we enter this Easter season we let us give thanks for a God who loves us so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

- I participated in the LiVE Project class: Mystics and Mysticism
- The Synod Policy Review Team continues to meet and work on updating key policies.
- The Synod Council met on March 21.
- I met with the Association of Synod Vice Presidents’ planning team on March 6 and facilitated our monthly Zoom on March 28.
- I attended a synod coaching training event on March 19.

BENEVOLENCE OF THE MONTH

SAFE HARBOR FREE CLINIC

Safe Harbor Free Clinic (SHFC) began as the vision of medical providers and community members who, when returning from a medical mission to Haiti, expressed concern that free medical care was not available to the underserved in their own community. SHFC was founded in October 2008 and the first medical walk-in clinic opened on June 19, 2009. Since that time, comprehensive healthcare services have been provided to almost 18,000 under/uninsured individuals.

The community's need for free healthcare became obvious as more clinic days were added to see patients. A Chronic Care Clinic opened in May 2011 since 40% of patients seen struggled to manage their diabetes. A Podiatry clinic and laboratory services were added in September 2011.

SHFC serves residents primarily from Snohomish, Skagit, and Island counties. Over 70,000 people have no access to affordable healthcare in these areas. SHFC is the only "brick and mortar" free clinic between Lynnwood and the Canadian border. Initially, the clinic was housed in the Skagit Regional Clinic building in Stanwood. Due to greater and greater need for free healthcare, SHFC secured its own facility which opened in August 2014.

With over 110 volunteers and providers, the facility offers several specialty clinics in addition to weekly Same-Day clinics. In 2022, Safe Harbor Free Clinic expanded its services to the neighboring community of Arlington/Smokey Point. Together, they show Christ's love by providing free healthcare to those in need, bringing healing and hope for the hurting.

The children have been exploring the themes of spring and Easter through a variety of fun crafts and hands-on activities. They have also helped plant seeds for our garden, taking part in the beginning stages of a special project. We are excited to nurture the garden together and watch the seeds grow into fresh produce that we will eventually use in our meals, giving the children the opportunity to see the full journey from garden to table.

Spring Break for school-aged children is April 6th–April 10th, and we will have our school-age group with us throughout the week. We are looking forward to a fun week filled with activities for them while they are out of school.

We are excited to begin utilizing the Procure app to enhance communication with families. This tool will allow us to easily share updates throughout the day, including photos, nap times, meals, diaper changes, and activities. We look forward to using this app to help families stay connected with their child's daily experiences at childcare.

We are happy to welcome 4 new families to our childcare! At this time, our 4–5-year-old classroom is full through September, and our 2–3 year old classroom currently has a two-month waitlist for full-time care, with limited part-time availability. We currently have openings for before and after school care for school-aged children.

To help cover the cost of creating the garden, we are hosting a Pick-a-Date to Donate fundraiser. Families are invited to select a day, or multiple days on the calendar and donate the corresponding dollar amount (for example, choosing the 10th would be a \$10 donation). A calendar and donation envelopes will be available in the fellowship hall for anyone who would like to participate and support our garden project.

Camano Lutheran Church 120 Years

In "Camano Island: Life and Times in Island Paradise," the authors Art Kimball and John Dean wrote about the start of what would become Camano Lutheran Church.

Official organization occurred December 17, 1890, in a hall at Utsaladdy, aided by Stanwood's Rev. Christian Jorgensen," the authors wrote.

The congregation also met in the Livingston Bay School for years.

Construction of Camano Island's first church began in 1904, and the building was dedicated in 1906.

The church was built by the congregants, which included the family of Camano Island's now-retired state Sen. Mary Margaret Haugen.

"My grandfather, Hans Olsen, who emigrated from Norway and came to Camano Island in 1900 was part of the group who volunteered their time to build Camano Lutheran," she said. "He was also instrumental in starting the Sunday school."

Although there have been updates and additions over the years, Camano Lutheran's white building with its distinctive spire at 850 Heichel Road is a landmark to this day.

Haugen said her family parted ways with Camano Lutheran when she was a youngster and began attending the Methodist church in Stanwood.

"Going to church on Sundays was such an important part of family life back then," she said. "It was not only where we went to worship, but it was a place where we could all connect socially and experience true fellowship with our neighbors."
