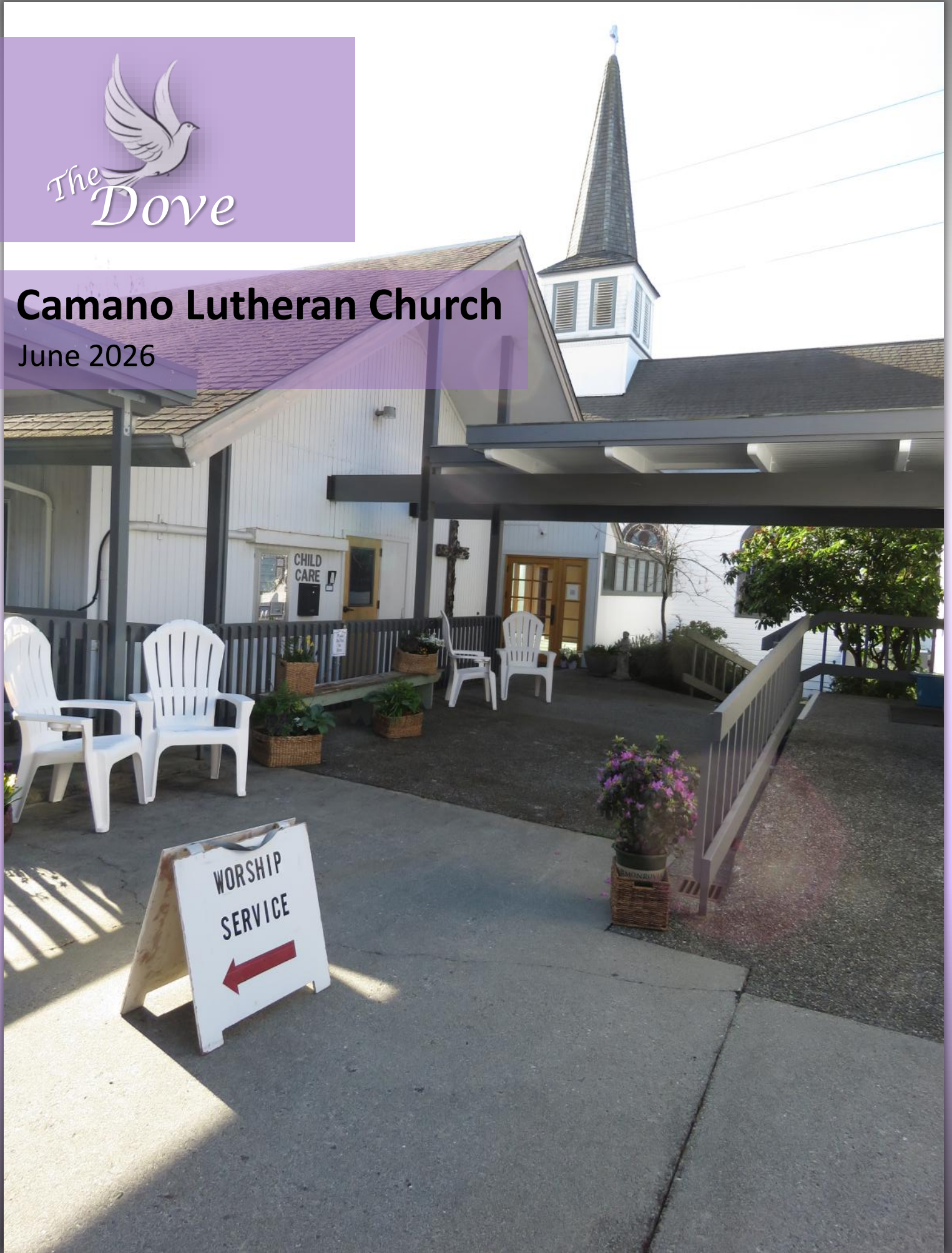

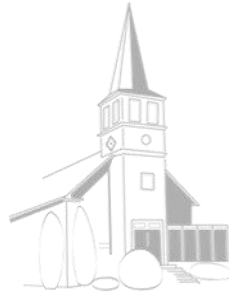

Reflections with Pastor Scott



Sabbatical Theme and Questions

Last month, we focused on what a sabbatical is and why it is offered. This month, we want to share more about the theme of the sabbatical and answer some of the questions surrounding this special time for both pastor and congregation.

The theme for the sabbatical will be **“Sabbath Connection.”** As mentioned previously, this is not only a time of renewal for the pastor, but also an opportunity for renewal within the congregation.

For me personally, the “Sabbath Connection” will begin with stepping away from the everyday responsibilities of pastoral ministry — the constant planning, concerns, and thoughts connected to the life of the church are running through my mind at all hours of the day or night. It will be a time to reconnect with Christ within my own faith journey through scripture reading, prayer, meditation, walking, listening, and however the Holy Spirit may lead.

Another important area of connection will be with family. Pastors’ families often sacrifice weekends, holidays, and uninterrupted time together because so many of those moments are filled with ministry responsibilities. I look forward to spending meaningful time with Lisa, as well as traveling to visit my brother in Arkansas and my niece and nephews on the East Coast. The last time we were all together was for my mother’s funeral in 2009, so this time together will be especially meaningful.

A third area of focus will be physical health. Over the past several years, a variety of circumstances have affected my overall health. While I have made efforts to address this, the pace and demands of daily life have often made lasting change difficult. During the sabbatical, I hope to reestablish healthier rhythms and habits, recognizing how deeply physical well-being impacts every area of life and ministry.

The congregation’s “Sabbath Connection” will focus strongly on connection with one another and with our wider ministries and benevolences. During the sabbatical, we will welcome visiting speakers on Sunday mornings who will help us strengthen our connection to the broader church and the ministries we support together.

In addition, our Fellowship Ministry Team will be planning intentional events throughout the sabbatical to provide opportunities for members to simply gather, connect, and enjoy time together. Please watch for announcements and details about these events in the coming months.

Our Care Team will also continue expanding its ministry of connection by reaching out to members who are unable to attend worship in person but would welcome visits and communion wherever they are currently living.

We pray this sabbatical season will be a meaningful time of renewal, rest, and deeper connection for both pastor and congregation as together we continue to grow in faith and life in Christ.

How long is the sabbatical? It begins with the sending service on August 2 and ends with the returning service on November 1. (Note: we will have a special sending service at the beginning of the sabbatical to send each other off in a meaningful way and a receiving service as the end as we re-connect for ministry together once again).



Is Pastor Scott available at all during this time? No. A key piece of the sabbatical is intentional renewal time and that means time away from the daily responsibilities of a parish pastor. Pastor Scott will not be receiving calls or performing any pastoral duties related to CLC during this time period.

What if I see Pastor Scott around town? Can I talk to him? Of course! Just try and keep the conversation away from what is going on at church. We want this to be a time where Pastor Scott doesn't have to worry about the daily concerns of the church.

What if I have a pastoral need or emergency? Our own Pastor Mike Swain will be available during August 1- September 15 of the sabbatical time to respond to pastoral emergencies and lead worship on Sunday mornings. From September 16 -November 1, Pastor Carl Gabrielson will be leading the worship services, but pastoral care emergencies will be handled by the various pastors on call from our local conference churches. What about Sunday worship? Who will be sharing the message? The sabbatical team is lining up different speakers who will share the Good News about what God is doing within their ministry setting. Many of these groups are part of our benevolence that we support. We will also have a few lay members from CLC share the message reminding us of the priesthood of all believers and the many and various gifts we all share here at CLC. Our hope is that these ministries may be ones that stir your interest and perhaps involvement in the future.

May the Spirit stir each of us during this sabbatical time,

From the Bishop:

What is the Bible? Some say the Bible is a book that dropped down from heaven completely written. Some say the Bible is nothing but a bunch of stories from long ago that don't matter. Neither of these are accurate. Instead, what we as Lutherans believe, is that the Bible is a sacred and holy book because through its 66 books – the stories, poems, history, laments, letters, and more – the Bible points us toward Jesus. Jesus, the One who reveals God's grace, mercy, justice, and love for the world.

As Lutherans, we understand that the center of the Bible is always Jesus. Martin Luther famously said that when we read scripture, we should ask, "Does it show Christ?" In other words, does this verse or passage reveal God made known in Jesus? Does it move us toward peace, wholeness, reconciliation, forgiveness, and love? Or is it being twisted to justify oppression, cruelty, and exclusion? Luther believed that faithful people do not simply quote isolated verses. We are to wrestle with scripture honestly and faithfully always through the lens of Jesus.

Luther also insisted that scripture must interpret scripture. No single verse stands alone. Every verse and passage and book is meant to be in conversation with the broader arc of scripture – with the prophets, the gospels, the letters, and, especially, with the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. This means we read the Bible seriously, but not literally. We pay attention to context, history, genre, and the larger witness of God's love. When a verse seems to pull us toward harm or violence, we are called to read the passage again, asking whether the interpretation is consistent with God as revealed in Jesus.

I chose to write on how to read the Bible because, quite frankly, what the bible is and biblical interpretation matters deeply right now. I see scripture being selectively quoted by people in power to dehumanize and scapegoat vulnerable communities, glorify wealth and power, and distort sacred texts into slogans. Verses are being lifted out of context while the broader witness of Jesus' life is ignored.

Earlier this year, I watched a recruitment video for the U.S. Department of Homeland Security that opened with helicopters flying overhead and the words from Matthew 5:9 on the screen: Blessed are the peacemakers. What followed were images of heavily armed men in tactical gear carrying weapons, breaking down doors, and carrying out violent raids against immigrants. I could not help but notice how far this imagery stands from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, the very place from which that verse is taken.

On the eve of the 250th anniversary of this country, I pray that we would reject the misuse of scripture and instead read scripture faithfully so that we might follow Jesus more closely. I pray that we would acknowledge our own complicity, resist the temptation towards power or fear, care for those who are vulnerable, and stand up and speak out truthfully and prophetically.

Let us return to the prophets who call for justice and care for the poor. Let us return to the Sermon on the Mount where Jesus blesses the meek, the merciful, and the peacemakers. Let us return to the cross, where God rejected violence and domination as the final word. Let us rejoice in the resurrection, where hope, mercy, and love rise again even in the midst of fear and despair. Let us read scripture faithfully and let us follow Jesus.

I kept my eyes focused on the coin slot, but I could still feel everyone smiling, waiting for the last coin to go in...

7...8!

The "Old Basement" Sunday School Hall at Messiah Lutheran erupted with claps and cheers! After each person who was celebrating a birthday that week had their turn to drop their coins into the birthday box, all the Sunday School classes would sing "Happy Birthday!"

This was how we celebrated birthdays when I was growing up, and it's also one of my earliest memories of how the church helped teach me how to enthusiastically practice generosity. This ritual made me (and hopefully others) feel special on our birthday, but it also helped us learn that giving was a joyful experience and something that could be shared with the community.

There were other times, though, when giving in church seemed very private, almost secretive. My mom let me put our offering in the plate as the ushers came along, but she told me, "We put our offering in an envelope, face down in the plate, because what we give is just between us and God." This felt much more solemn and personal, not bad, just different. Giving was something sacred.

Do you remember who taught you about generosity when you were growing up? Did your family or faith community have any special practices or rituals? How has your giving changed over the years? How do you teach others - through words or actions - about giving and generosity?

It's sometimes interesting for me to reflect on how I was formed, about the influences that helped shape the person I am today. These two examples are only the tip of the iceberg when I think about how much the church - in so many contexts and in so many ways - has impacted not only my practices of generosity, but what I hope I can pass on to others. I'm so grateful for what has been shared with me. Someday I'll get to say thank you to so many saints along the way who've taught me about generosity (not all of them in the church, but a good many of them have been).

And, I also want to thank you, for your generosity - to your church and to the world. Thank you for trying to make the world a better place through your words and deeds - by serving, by giving, by sharing your skills, experiences, gifts, and hopes. Thank you for giving to the church and for helping to make sure the church, in its many forms, is a space where others can continue to learn about God, who is Love - our Creator, Teacher, Friend, Guide, Helper, and so much more.

May 2026 Notes From The Property Maintenance Team

The following tasks were accomplished during the past month:

Replaced door knobs in Child Care main bathrooms so doors could be unlocked from hallway.

Received contract from Dick's Electric to replace dishwasher and funding approval from Council. Contract has been signed, deposit submitted, we are presently awaiting delivery information from the factory, followed by installation date. In the meantime, we are making preparations for the installation (electrical, plumbing, etc.) Patience, patience, patience.

The Camano Lutheran Quilters' boxed quilts and care kits were delivered to Our Redeemers Lutheran Church in Seattle before being shipped to Luther World Relief.

Of Note: Each Monday morning "our ladies" faithfully spend three hours measuring, cutting, and sewing quilts, without complaint (okay, maybe one or two) to make the beautiful quilts that are shipped worldwide. They are a friendly, chatty group that enjoy each other's company and can always use a helping hand from anyone interested in spending some time with them. It is a very rewarding, worthwhile cause to start your week off.

Replaced missing seat screws in Pioneer Hall metal chair.

Relaced small piece of wooden cabinet trim that had come loose in Child Care.

Gutters along the parking lot curb became cluttered and drain grating became clogged. Gutters swept, grating unclogged.

Unfortunately, some of our entry doors have developed hiccups as they have aged (who hasn't?) and are sometimes difficult to lock and unlock. In particular, both the north doors (exit by kitchen, and the exit to the playground) have "crash bars" (not sure if that term is correct but I think you know what I mean) that sometimes won't relock after the bar is returned to the "lock" position. Thus, the doors can't be locked. If/when that happens, "Encouraging words", kicking, banging, etc. don't work (so I've been told), but using the entry key on the outside to lock the door usually releases the bar and locks the door again.

As always, we are always looking for volunteers, for a variety of tasks around the church.

Markus Ginting is a hardworking farmer in Indonesia. His main crop is potatoes, which he used to grow the traditional way using conventional fertilizers and pesticides. Before he learned new methods, he would lose up to 40% of his crops to diseases every year — making it difficult to afford his children's school fees and other basic needs for his family.

A few years ago, everything changed when LWR taught him how to make organic fertilizers from plant waste and manure from his own farm. Today, his crops are healthier and are no longer dying from diseases at high rates. This means he can sell more potatoes for the same amount of effort. This added income, plus the money he saves by making his own fertilizers, has given his children healthy food, access to education and much greater hope for the future.

Thank you for changing lives with your generosity. I'm excited to see whose life you will change next... until your love reaches every neighbor.
