Reflections with Pastor Scott

Intentional The Journey of Lent and Repentance



One of the major themes of lent is repentance. For those who have been in the church a long time, this is an all too familiar term. In fact, so familiar we may shrug it off quickly. "Yeah, I know what it means." Well, a recent article I read and a devotion I listened to reminded me I needed a refresher, perhaps you can use one too.

In an article titled "What Does Repentance Mean" on ASK the UMC I read the following. "The biblical meaning of the Hebrew word to repent, shuv, is "to turn and go a different direction." In Greek, this term was rendered metanoia, meaning "to change ones mindset." The selection of this verb in Greek revealed A fundamental difference between Hebrew and Greek culture and language. For the ancient Hebrews life was experienced and filtered primarily through the actions and senses of the body. In Greek culture and language, life was experienced and filtered primarily through the perceptions of the mind. The Greek understanding of "changing ones mindset" was parallel to the Hebrew idea of a physical "turning." Both convey what today we might speak of as making a 180. You were heading One Direction. Now You are heading another.

It's important to get this concept right, important enough that the first words of Martin Luther's 95 theses, what many would consider the first "trumpet blast" of the Protestant Reformation, are about repentance. Why? Because many Latin translations had used poienitentiam agree, penance, and its root, poena, punishment. The Latin translation suggested that repentance was about carrying out the requirements of the punishment earned because you had send and showing that you were serious about accepting the responsibility to make things right.

Not so, said Luther. The call to repent wasn't simply to mend what you broke or endure some punishment because you broke it. Luther's reading was much closer to the Greek - an "inward repentance," a "change of mindset" that should result in a change in behavior. For Luther, repentance is fundamentally about turning back to God."

This idea of repentance being about punishment is how I most often heard reopentance described by those around me in the church. It was about being punished for something. In fact, the above mentioned Latin translation of punishment seems to fit various groups in the larger church that use the term repentance to try to "scare the hell" out of somebody. The point out others are being punished or will be punished if they don't repent. It's what you often see of the people at an event with bull horns and signs proclaiming,

"Repent or God will [punish you!". I think this way of addressing repentance often does more harm than good.

In a recent devotion by Professor Esau McCauley, he pointed out how most of the time Jesus shows who God is through words and actions of love, mercy and forgiveness and then repentance happens for receiver of this gift. Doesn't that make sense? If we're just screaming, "Repent!", a person might ask, "from what and turn to who or what?"



When one sees the fullness of love lived out as it is in Jesus, we see again and again in scripture that people then "repent," turn toward God and make that change of mindset. Think about Zacchaeus or the woman caught in adultery or the father whose daughter was made well.

So, for us as a church we are called back to the gospel as a way to see the love of God, which can literally move us towards repentance and transform us in such a way that we move in a new direction. A direction that bears the light of Christ and brings healing and life not only to ourselves. but to all who experience the love of Christ.

The Bishop's Article from the March 2024 Edition of The Spirit



From the Bishop:

During the cold snap in January, I realized that the hummingbird food had frozen again. I went outside to replace it and noticed a hummingbird just sitting, seemingly frozen, perched on

one of the little prongs of the feeder. Now, usually the hummingbirds I feed are fierce. They swirl around my head demanding new syrup and for me to move out of their way. They exert a force that, if bigger, would be scary. But this one did nothing as I moved closer.

I stood there. Not sure what to do. Do I shoo it away? Do I simply hope it moves when I reach out? Do I come back later hoping this bird is still alive?

As in most things we do these days, I decided to research online. According to the website Science, hummingbirds may appear "frozen" on a feeder, but they're using torpor to conserve energy. This article urges one to not disturb them as this is a natural behavior and allows them to save their energy.

With this, I decided to wait until the hummingbird flew off before replacing the feeder with fresh syrup (which happened about a half hour later).

So why tell you this small story of hummingbirds and me? I think there is some overlap between energy and torpor and what this all might mean for us as church together.

While not a perfect analogy, sometimes we can act like hummingbirds swirling and swooping, using lots of energy to do things. Sometimes we think that if we aren't doing activities, or if other people aren't doing activities, then we are failing as a church. It reminds me of a pastor saying to me at an event

for Rostered Ministers, "Bishop, I feel that I have to attend everything that is planned. But, may I ask, is everything planned necessary?"

Perhaps we use energy up when it is not necessary. Perhaps, like the hummingbird, we also need a time of torpor. Perhaps we need a "time out" time or a reflection time or a meditative time or just a time to inhale and exhale without worrying about the next event or program or activity. As theologian Richard Rohr puts it when describing centering prayer, "Prayer is simply sitting in silence, open to God's love and your love for God. This prayer is beyond thoughts, emotions, or sensations."

Dear Beloveds in Christ, Lent is here. As we plan and attend the meaningful worship and fellowship that we all love during the season of Lent, I pray that in worship and in other ways you can find the space and openness to embrace the wonder of the Spirit.

For we can learn from hummingbirds – not that we are to eat one and a half to three times our body weight every day like a hummingbird – but instead, we are called to have a flow between busyness and stillness, action and reflection, hustling and torpor, acts and prayer.

I pray that as we follow Jesus, as we live in Jesus' love, as we contemplate his words and actions, we may do the same.

In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed. Mark 1:35

LENTEN MIDWEEKS, SPECIAL OFFERINGS AND EASTER SCHEDULE

Greetings and warmest blessings as we shake off the vestiges of dreary winter and anticipate the flowers and clear blue skies that herald spring and warmer temperatures.

The 40 days that follow Ash Wednesday, Lent – a time of repentance. How do you observe Lent? Church tenets tell us there are 3 pillars of Lent; prayer, fasting and giving.

<u>Prayer</u>......becoming attuned to God's voice, seeking forgiveness and growing closer to Him. "Whether we realize it or not, prayer is the encounter of God's thirst with ours. God thirsts that we may thirst for him" St. Augustine

<u>Fasting......</u> self-denial; to repent; to open our hearts to the Lord; to pray for specific intentions. Fasting is an incredible form of prayer. Fast to give the Lord access to your heart. We should not fast simply because it's "the thing to do". Pray that the Lord move your heart to fast out of love for Him and a desire to grow closer to Him. Fast to repent, to turn away from sin. Fasting cannot make up for our sin, rather it shows our sorrow and offers a small reparation for our offense against God. When fasting we discipline our bodies and train our minds to obey God's will. Fasting becomes an act of worship where we turn away from temptation and toward God. When fasting from things, it removes clutter from our day, lives and schedules, freeing up time and space, physically, mentally and spiritually to focus on Christ and allowing Him to take up more room in our lives and a greater presence in our hearts.

<u>Almsgiving......</u> Almsgiving is the act of donating money or goods to the poor or performing other acts of charity. More than simply giving money, it becomes an act of love that can deepen our prayer life and bring a greater sense of meaning to fasting. It is an outward sign of Christian love for others generally involving some type of sacrifice on behalf of the giver in order to provide for the needs of the other. In doing this, bonds of community are formed. The roots of the word "alms" can be found in ancient Latin and Greek words meaning mercy and pity. The root of the word "charity" comes from the Latin "caritas," meaning love.

It can deepen our prayer as we are brought into contact with our brothers and sisters who live in poverty and give us a greater understanding of what it means to go without while fasting.

It can also prompt important questions: Do I really need this? Am I consuming too much? Almsgiving provides us with a human connection and the opportunity to see the impact that works of charity can have on others.

A NOTE FROM THE PROPERTY TEAM

Last fall the Church Council approved a contract with a painting firm to paint the outside of Pioneer Hall and the north wall of the historic sanctuary. This project is clearly necessary as evidenced by the old paint flaking off the walls of both buildings. The bid for this project was about \$14,000 which would spend half of what is available in Camano Lutheran's building maintenance fund. Site preparation to deal with the trees and shrubs close to the building could add additional expenses.

This is not the only project needing to be done to preserve our buildings. The exterior of the childcare building needs painting as do the east wall and steeple of the historic sanctuary. The soffits of the multipurpose/ preschool building need to be replaced and painted. These projects fall within our team's commitment to stewardship: the careful and responsible management of something entrusted to our care.

CLC's building maintenance fund currently has \$28,054. These funds are used for all maintenance and repairs. Last year \$8,700 was spent on maintenance with the largest portion used to fix the multipurpose room heat pumps. Future emergency needs could be costly, especially if the heat pumps need to be replaced.

At this time, we are asking for **designated contributions** to the **CLC building maintenance fund**. This request is with the caution that individual gifts should not interfere with or replace regular giving; the mission of the church should always come first.

JANUARY 2024 PROPERTY TEAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Another month, another year, another significant contribution to our learning curve. Overall a light month with small tasks, however, we experienced one that had the potential to be much greater.

- 1. The Good News: During the frigid temperatures the heating systems worked great. The Bad News: Unfortunately, the faucets servicing the kitchen triple sinks along the windowed south wall, and those in the Pre-School classrooms, froze solid. After many hours of heat in the kitchen, along with some encouraging words, drips finally appeared. Then slowly, ever so slowly, water began to flow. Eventually all worked properly, and more importantly, no broken or leaky pipes were discovered.
- 2. Descaled the kitchen dishwasher.
- 3. Reset popped circuit breaker for the lights on the large Advent candles.
- 4. Stored the Christmas decorations that were taken down in the Fellowship Hall. Sadly, that beautiful tree is now resting on the burn pile.
- 5. Monitored the satisfactory inspection of the septic tanks. A pumping will be necessary in the fall.
- 6. Cut down and removed a courtyard tree that had fallen onto the gutter and side of Pioneer Hall near the entrance. The impact against the building was lessened when the tree first struck, and rested against, the small angel between it and the landscaping rocks. No damage to the angel, no damage to Pioneer Hall.
- 7. Several large branches brushing the sides of Pioneer Hall were cut down to provide space for the painters in the spring.

For those who might experience football withdrawals after the Super Bowl, and possibly looking for something worthwhile to do, we might have a challenging project, hopefully in late February-early March timeframe, that would require your assistance.




Grace and Peace to you.

Welcome to 2024! It feels so futuristic to say that number because I remember so many things from the 70s and 80s that predicted what this time in history could be like. I remember Star Trek and their "Communicator" device that looks just like today's flip phones and "Replicators" that could print 3D food. Now we have 3D printing that creates objects out of metal, plastic and glass. All of this really has little to do with Safe Harbor Free Clinic, however I spent time thinking how dreams of what could be in the future can actually become a reality.

In the past year, we have seen a 20% increase in new patients, some of whom are new to our country and have no alternative for their healthcare needs. Many have chronic conditions that require treatment and monitoring. Lack of ability to afford proper healthcare causes many people to live with their damaging health conditions instead of seeking treatment.

This is where Safe Harbor fills the gap. Each of the 1242 patient visits last year represent an individual who likely would have gone untreated were it not for Safe Harbor Free Clinic. We offer them the opportunity to improve their health, to see healing in their lives, and to live in a healthier way as they settle into a new culture.

We have so many testimonials on how God has used Safe Harbor to speak into the lives of our patients, how He has moved through our staff and volunteers to bring hope and healing to those who are hurting. We look to the year ahead of us and pray that we will continue to serve others well in all that we do.

Thank you for being such a generous part of this by supporting the mission of Safe Harbor to show Christ's love by providing free healthcare to those in need.
