I wanted to use this month's article to say thank you to so many people for their help during Lent and Easter and share the impact of a moment in worship during holy week for one of our members. First the thank-yous. Thank you to our musicians that offered their gifts of music for Sunday and Lent midweek services of Holden Evening Prayer. We literally could not have had our midweek services without you. I also want to thank the staff for all of their hard work as Lent has many extra facets and services to it that require a great deal more of the staff's time and gifts. You are a blessing. Next, I want to say a big thank you to everyone who brought flowers in whatever form you shared them for our Easter Service. What a blessing it was to come into a sacred space filled with such light and love that the celebration of Christ's resurrection brings forth. Thank you to our work crew for getting the grounds mowed and in shape as spring brought forth new growth and for transforming the courtyard into vibrant new colors for all who come on our campus. Finally, thank you to all of you that participated in one form or another throughout the season of lent through volunteering in one form or another or simply being present in person or online to engage the journey of Christ to the cross, his death and resurrection.

There were many moments throughout the season of Lent that were impactful for me. Hearing Pastor Erik's voice raise from his knees as he sang, "Behold, the life-giving cross" at our cluster Good Friday service. I still have goosebumps. To my surprise I found it to be a very profound experience. First, I served pastor Scott, wow, then I served the rest of the congregation. As I had eye contact with many and offered them wine, Christ's blood, I was deeply moved, and I almost cried. You too might have this opportunity to enhance your worship by letting pastor know you would be willing to assist him. It was an honor to serve. Marilyn Smith*

No this isn't a ploy with her last sentence to get you to volunteer lol. It is to show you the impact, taking a risk and stepping outside one's comfort zone can have on someone. Especially when it is tied to worship and the sacraments and the Spirit at work. Marilyn said she almost cried. Well, I can tell you that her eyes were filled with tears when she told me this very experience. I could literally see the deep impact it had on her still, so many days later.



All of your help, all of your sharing of your gifts of time and talents or simply making yourself present and open to God's presence, helps provide an opportunity for the Spirit of God to stir in people's deepest soul, your own soul, and transform them and you. I hope you already have this Lenten season or will experience the transforming power of the cross this Easter season, even if it is only for the briefest of moments. It is the gift of God's presence for you.

## The Bishop's Article from the May 2022 Edition of The Spirit



### **From the Bishop:**

I recently watched a documentary series that talked about bodies. In this documentary it was pointed out how in our society certain bodies are acceptable and “beautiful” (usually thin, young, female, white, etc.) and other bodies are not (usually fat, old, disabled, disfigured, etc.) One of the suggestions in this documentary to counteract society’s shaming culture about bodies is to stand in front of a mirror and look at your body. And, as you look at your body, to name, out loud, the positive things that you see in the mirror. For five minutes. Five. Minutes. This is a long time. And, to be honest, I have a much easier time naming my body’s deficits than attributes. Perhaps you can relate to this.

I think that we have the same problem when it comes to “church bodies.” Just as individual bodies are critiqued, church bodies are critiqued in this society, as well. A church body that has 800 bodies in it seems “sexier” than a church body that has 40 bodies in it. A church body that has younger bodies in it seems more attractive than a church body that has older bodies in it. A church body that has X, Y, or Z seems better than a church body that has R, P, or G (you fill in the letters). We have narrowed what it means to be beautiful and viable in the church much like we have with people in society - and if your particular context is different, it is easy to become tired and overwhelmed. It is easy to feel overlooked and shamed. It is easy, quite simply, to be discouraged.

But what if we expanded what it means to be the body of the church? What if – much like beauty standards need to do – we embraced a diversity of sizes and shapes? What if we truly incorporated what God does constantly – create and shape and grow and nurture a multitude of church bodies for the sake of the good news of Jesus?

I mean ... just as God never intended for the evergreen to be the only tree on earth (as beautiful as our state tree is), God never intended for one body to be the perfect body (as beautiful as each body is). The same goes for our church bodies. Think if we truly embraced the young and the old, the small and the large, the variety and multi-faceted ways of being church – including celebrating all that we do and are for the sake of the Gospel.

What if we listed all of the ministries that we participate in and that we partner with others outside of the church? What if we looked at the ministries that last a month or a year as important as those that last for decades? What if we said “yes” to ideas that seem different from what we’ve always done? What if we expanded church beyond worship on Sunday morning to ... what? What would you say? What do you envision? How is your imagination sparked through the Holy Spirit?

I encourage you to do the same exercise that is suggested from that documentary I mentioned above – only hold the mirror to our church body. What are you seeing and experiencing as attributes? What do you love about the church body that you participate in? What is beautiful? What formative experience is deep within you that you hold onto and would like to share with others? What do you see as a possibility beyond what you have been doing? What do you see as an obstacle that perhaps, upon closer inspection, could be a passageway? How has God gifted your community? Where is God’s Spirit nudging you now?

*For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, enslaved or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. 1 Corinthians 12:12-13*

## **MARCH 2022 CLC PROPERTY TEAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

1. Changed Fellowship Hall thermostat, lowering the high temperature setting.
2. Installed a "mail" box on the wall outside the Child Care office door.
3. Installed three new support posts under the roof over the south office walkway. This was a major project. A special thanks to Dan for taking the lead on this. (See the DOVE for photos of the crew at work)
4. Arranged for our septic system check and annual recertification of operations which was needed to meet requirements for Child Care.
5. Installed a new emergency (battery backup) green exit sign near the lower level door at Child Care.
6. Bird nests being constructed on overhead beams of roof between plaza buildings were removed. (several times)
8. The large Church entrance sign was still posting the old service times. Had a cover block constructed and this was placed over the misleading information.
9. Worked with Child Care Director on planning to meet new requirements for play ground fences and gates requirements.
10. The mowing crew has resumed near full time operations.
11. Installation of new main locking mailbox on street.

## LWR PERSONAL CARE KITS



The ladies of CLC have been busy making Personal Care Kits for Lutheran World Relief. At last count, they had made 209 individual kits this round! Thank you ladies for all of your hard work and care!



## ***Blessed to be a Blessing – Lutheran World Relief News***

The Spring Ingathering for Lutheran World Relief is almost here. Our completed quilts, personal care kits, and baby care kits will be blessed at the May 8<sup>th</sup> service. These gifts represent hours of time and talent and donations of materials. At least 75 quilts, 233 personal care kits, and 60 baby care kits will be delivered to Seattle on May 14<sup>th</sup> to be loaded in a shipping container bound for a Lutheran World Relief warehouse in Minnesota or Maryland. From there they will be distributed as needed around the world.

In 2021, LWR quilts and kits reached 19 countries: Guatemala, El Salvador, Haiti, Nicaragua, Bahama, Dominican Republic, Peru, Bolivia, Ukraine, Bosnia, Serbia, Georgia, Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon, Mali, Angola, Tanzania, and Burkina Faso. The 2021 Seattle Ingathering totaled over 63,000 pounds including 10,750 quilts and blankets and nearly 10,000 kits – the work of 80 congregations.

At worship on Sunday, May 8<sup>th</sup>, you will have a chance to donate toward the shipping costs. We will be sending off approximately 1000 pounds of quilts and kits. Shipping from Seattle to the LWR warehouse costs \$0.21 a pound. To reach those in need around the world, is an additional \$0.54 per pound. Your gifts of coins, cash or checks for LWR shipping will be appreciated!

A special thanks to all who have participated in this year's projects. We are also thankful for the Thrivent Care Team money that has provided \$\$\$ to purchase quilt batting, soap, and baby items.

Rajendra, Kashwala and his wife Nikky Devi used to have a hard time sleeping, as they feared they'd be woken in the night by rising floodwaters that would wash away their home, gardens and livestock. It had happened several times before — the river near their home in India would swell without warning and sweep everything away, leaving their family vulnerable to hunger.

But your kindness reached them on the banks of the river. For them, your love sounds like an announcement made through a tiny megaphone, letting them know a flood is coming. This early warning system urges their entire village to take action — to move to higher ground well before the floodwaters arrive. Your love is also teaching them new farming techniques — like growing food on rooftops or in hanging baskets — so their vital crops don't wash away. Now Rajendra, Nikky and their children can rest easier at night, knowing their crops and futures are more secure.



Our gifts make it possible for ELCA World Hunger to be present throughout the United States and the world


The ELCA World Hunger Program supports meaningful solutions that get at the root causes of hunger, from health clinics to microloans, food pantries to soup kitchens, advocacy to community organizing. Ending hunger is about more than food. Long-term, sustainable change can be accomplished by connecting people with the resources they need to produce food and gain access to clean water, education, health care and sources of income.

The ELCA World Hunger Program has established relationships in the U.S. and around the world that have created an infrastructure that allows it to be very cost efficient and effective – less than 15 cents of every dollar is used for program administration and fundraising.

Yes, hunger is a big problem, but by taking **one step** now, we can be part of the journey that will make a difference in many people's lives.

## Answering God's Call To SERVE REFUGEES

From Jewish Law to Christian Gospel, the call of God is unmistakable. **The Church and its people must care for the foreigner and stranger, the oppressed and dispossessed – in a word, the refugee.** And when we answer that call, blessings return to us tenfold. Foreigners become friends. Strangers become neighbors. Refugees contribute to our broader economy, culture and community.

At Lutheran Community Services Northwest, we are grateful for Church partners who support this work with hands, hearts and prayers. With your help we have resettled more than **700 Afghans** since August. But the work is far from done. Today we stand at an Easter season crossroads, **preparing for a wave of Ukrainian evacuees, plus more Afghans.** The pace is also quickening for refugees arriving from other continents.

**Leviticus 19:34** - "The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt."

**Hebrews 13:2** - "Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it."

Answering the call is no less urgent than it was nine months ago.
