## **Reflections with Pastor Scott**

## **Gratitude**



As November is upon us, we will celebrate All Saints Sunday on November 5<sup>th</sup> in which we will remember the saints that have gone before us. These are people

that have helped keep the larger church and Camano Lutheran Church a place where the gift of God's grace through Christ is made known in many and various ways. It is also a day we give thanks for the Saints in our lives, who have been a blessing and helped us grow in faith. November is also a time when over the Thanksgiving weekend we often pause and give thanks for several realities in our life.

The first area of focus in our Aging Mastery Class 15 of us from CLC are taking at the Camano Center is Gratitude. In our core curriculum book from the National Council on aging we read,

"Why is gratitude so important? The question has so many answers. Gratitude grounds us in life and nudges us to be always mindful of our place in the world. Moreover, recent studies have shown that gratitude has a uniquely powerful relationship with health and well-being, both ours and that of those around us. When people have higher levels of gratitude, they tend to be more socially connected, be better able to handle stress, have lower levels of depression, have better sleep quality, and have stronger biomarkers such as higher rates of good cholesterol.

Appreciating the world around us from the moment we wake up to the moment we go to sleep is a skill to be learned and incorporated into daily living. By practicing gratitude, over time, we can learn to notice and appreciate not only the things that are going well in our lives, but also develop better attitudes about the 'negative' things, potentially changing those negatives to positives."

Changing those "negative things to positive." There are so many large and small negative things happening in our world today that it can overwhelm us with the thought that there is nothing good and nothing worth giving thanks for. Nothing could be further from the truth. I think major strength of Jesus was his trust in God that amidst all the struggles he faced, God would be present and when God is present there is always the possibility for life and blessing to spring forth.

We live as God's people trusting that God is present in every moment of every day. If we pause and truly look at our life on a daily basis we will realize that throughout one single day the majority of our interactions with people and time spent have a positive nature to them to which we can be thankful. When we limit our scope of life to what we hear on the news or on social media that is built to show us the extremes that grab our attention, one can be left feeling helpless and without hope. In Christ Jesus there is always hope and there is always the possibility for new life. When we pause each day to truly think about the things we have in our life and we are thankful for them, our entire attitude can shift and change in a direction that the quote above reminds us will have a positive effect on us and those around us.

So, take a few minutes each day throughout the month of November and write down three things you are thankful for. Then see if by the end of the month you notice a difference in your attitude and ability to see the many ways God is present bringing life into our world.

#### From the Bishop:

In the song Amazing Grace we sing, "I once was lost but now I'm found."

Because my job sometimes involves travel, there are times when I am wandering unfamiliar airports – trying to find my flight,

trying to find edible food, trying to find a place to charge my phone, trying to find a place where there isn't a cacophony of sound and crowds of people. And sometimes at airports I also experience a feeling like a disconnection from my "self." Sometimes I am wandering the airport trying to find my "self." Strangely, there are moments at airports where I get this feeling as though I am unmoored from what connects me to other people. Honestly, I don't know if this is something only I experience or if others feel the same way.

There have been a slew of recent articles and social media posts written about how churches are dying and pastors are leaving and people are upset and no one goes to church anymore and so on. These posts are hard to read, and I wonder - is this a sign that we are feeling unmoored? That we are searching for something? Or maybe it is simply being lost.

In the gospel of Luke, Jesus tells two parables – one about a lost sheep and one about a lost coin (Luke 15:1-10). You probably remember these parables – the shepherd leaves the ninety-nine in search of the one. The woman turns over her entire house for the one coin that is missing from her purse. I think that traditionally we hear these parables as Jesus searching for the one who needs to hear the good news of Jesus for the very first time. But I think that is a misreading. The lost lamb was a part of the shepherd's flock. The lost coin was in the woman's purse. This story is for insiders. For those who know and yet have gotten lost

This lostness might be of one's own volition. The sheep wanders from the prescribed pasture. But it can also be something that just happens. A coin cannot, on its own, get lost. We have all experienced the disruption of the pandemic, the cracks in our government, the warming of our climate causing suffering and death, and so much more. We notice changes in our churches and in our families and in our communities. Many of us have experienced personal troubles and tragedies. These all can lead to a sense of feeling adrift. And it can lead to fractures in our church community and our faith life.

However, the circumstance comes about – because of one's own actions or because of something that descends upon us – lostness occurs. And even when we know God's love and grace and comfort, even when we know that community is important, even when we are already part of God's community and church, we can still feel unmoored, lose our sense of belonging, our capacity to trust. We can get so lost that we don't know who we are or whose we are or where we belong anymore.

I don't know where you are at as you read this article today. Perhaps you are feeling snug with the other ninetynine in the sheepfold of God. Perhaps you are a coin cozy with the other nine coins. But perhaps you are not. Perhaps you, too, are wondering and wandering. Perhaps you, too, are feeling disconnected from friends or family or your church community. Perhaps you, too, are wandering in Concourse C wondering how in the world you get to Concourse A. Perhaps you, too, are a sheep bleating for help or a coin under the couch cushions.

If this is you, the good news is that God is a searcher and a finder. The amazing news is that God is the shepherd hiking into the wilderness looking for you. The astounding news is that God is the housewife lighting her lamp and sweeping every corner in the house to find you. You are worth looking for. You are loved and desired. And when God finds you, there is rejoicing and laughter and a party! As Dan Erlander writes, "Love is God's action to bring us into abundant life – reconciled to God, to each other, and all creation!"



## Stewardship Moment - Ways to Give

#### Did you know?

#### IRAs:

- If you are at least 70 ½ years young you can contribute funds directly from your IRA to Camano Lutheran Church.
- This is known as a Qualified Charitable Distribution or QCD.
- Such amounts are excluded from your taxable income up to \$100,000 per calendar year.
- A lower taxable income may have significant tax advantages for you, including reducing or avoiding Medicare premium IRMAA surcharges.
- Most IRA trustees will transfer funds on a regular schedule per your request i.e. monthly, quarterly, semi-annually.
- You may ask our bookkeeper (Teresa) to report your contribution in one lump sum or evenly over a specified number of months.
- Furthermore, you may designate how the funds are to be applied i.e. general offering, building maintenance & repair fund or a specific benevolence.

#### Appreciated Stock:

- You may donate appreciated stock to Camano Lutheran Church.
- Contact our bookkeeper for instructions on executing a stock transfer directly into Camano Lutheran's brokerage account.
- A direct transfer avoids the capital gain realized if the stock had been sold.
- We will liquidate the stock and transfer the money to our general cash account.
- You may designate how the funds are to be applied i.e. general offering, building maintenance & repair fund or a specific benevolence.

#### Online Giving:

- Online giving is convenient, easy, time-saving and resource conscious.
- Use it for single donations or to set up scheduled auto payments e.g. weekly or monthly
- Your scheduled auto payment may be split between General Offerings, Building Repair & Maintenance Fund, Benevolence of the Month (BOM) and church planting.

#### 1,633 GIFTS FOR CHILDREN

Through the Christmas House program, gave 1,633 presents to children during the holiday season in 2022.

#### <u>EVENTS</u>

Stanwood Camano Foodbank Services put together events for the purpose of raising food, funds, or both. They hold these events throughout the year. With your active participation, they are able to lend a hand to those who need it most.

#### **SEPTEMBER 2023 PROPERTY TEAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

1. Unfortunately, the heat pump problem is still ongoing. The malfunctioning valve was replaced, Unit #1 works properly for air conditioning, but still no heat. Troubleshooting by Andgar technicians and engineers will continue. Unit #2 is working properly and provides adequate heating for the fall season.

2. Conducted a walk-around visual inspection of Pioneer Hall, in particular the deteriorating outside paint. Contacted several painters but only two submitted serious bids, which were presented to the Board. One was accepted but work cannot begin until spring, after the rainy season.

3. Replaced/added screws securing storm windows protecting stained glass windows on southside of Small Sanctuary.

4. The Pioneer Hall bathroom window was left unlocked and open on several occasions. The lock has been taped, and a note posted to leave the window shut.

5. Unplugged a slow draining toilet in Child-Care bathroom. Cleaned inside of toilet tanks.

6. Burnt "electrical smell" reported in Pre-School classroom. Smell had dissipated by the time room was inspected but malfunctioning sump pump was suspected. Sump pump vent was found plugged. It was cleaned, drain lines were checked, pump now works properly, drains work properly, no more smells.

7. Descaled large kitchen dishwater.

8. All fire extinguishers received annual inspection by Pye-Barker, several were replaced. Smoke alarms were checked.

9. Hot water heaters in large sanctuary, Pioneer Hall, and Child-Care received their two-year inspection by Travelers.

10. Well water was tested by King Water and Island County.

11. Growing green grass was finally detected in the fields, regular "scheduled" mowing has begun again. Mowing and other yardwork around the buildings continues.

After a quiet summer it is nice to see the smiling little faces and hear the voices of the young ones that have returned to our spaces.

Dear Friends,

On behalf of the staff of Doctors Without Borders/Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF), I want to thank you for your generous gift of \$877.01 received on September 26, 2023.

Your contribution helps ensure that our patients receive the care they so urgently need, no matter their circumstances. In the last few months alone, support from caring donors like you has helped us respond to a range of emergencies in more than 70 countries, including:

 Earthquakes in Turkey and Syria: In February, over 50,000 people were killed by devastating earthquakes and aftershocks. With our teams already on the ground in northwest Syria, we mobilized an emergency response within hours of the first earthquake. We have treated more than 7,600 injured people.

 War in Ukraine: Our teams continue to deliver lifesaving care across the country in response to the ongoing war. In recent months, attacks on civilians have escalated.
 When an apartment building in Dhipro was struck by a missile in January of 2023-killing at least 40 people and injuring over 75-we were among the first to respond with medical care, psychological first aid, and relief items.



### JOSEPHINE CARING COMMUNITY

The Spiritual Care Department at Josephine is rooted in God's love and provides emotional and spiritual support to its residents, families, and staff. Over 110 residents are requesting chaplain visits on an ongoing basis. To respond to this important need, the department is offering our Chaplaincy Preparation Program which is a 9-month educational and experiential program to train volunteer chaplains.

The heartbeats of the program are inclusivity and listening so that all whom we serve are heard and what they hold to be sacred and meaningful is honored. Chaplains will be encouraged to discern and strengthen their own faith and values as well through the program.

The training is scheduled for January-August 2024 and will welcome a cohort of 4 new chaplains to join the 7 chaplains currently serving our residents. The experienced team supervising this program has over 25-years of Stephen Ministry leadership experience as well as 10-years of Clinical Pastoral Education experience.
