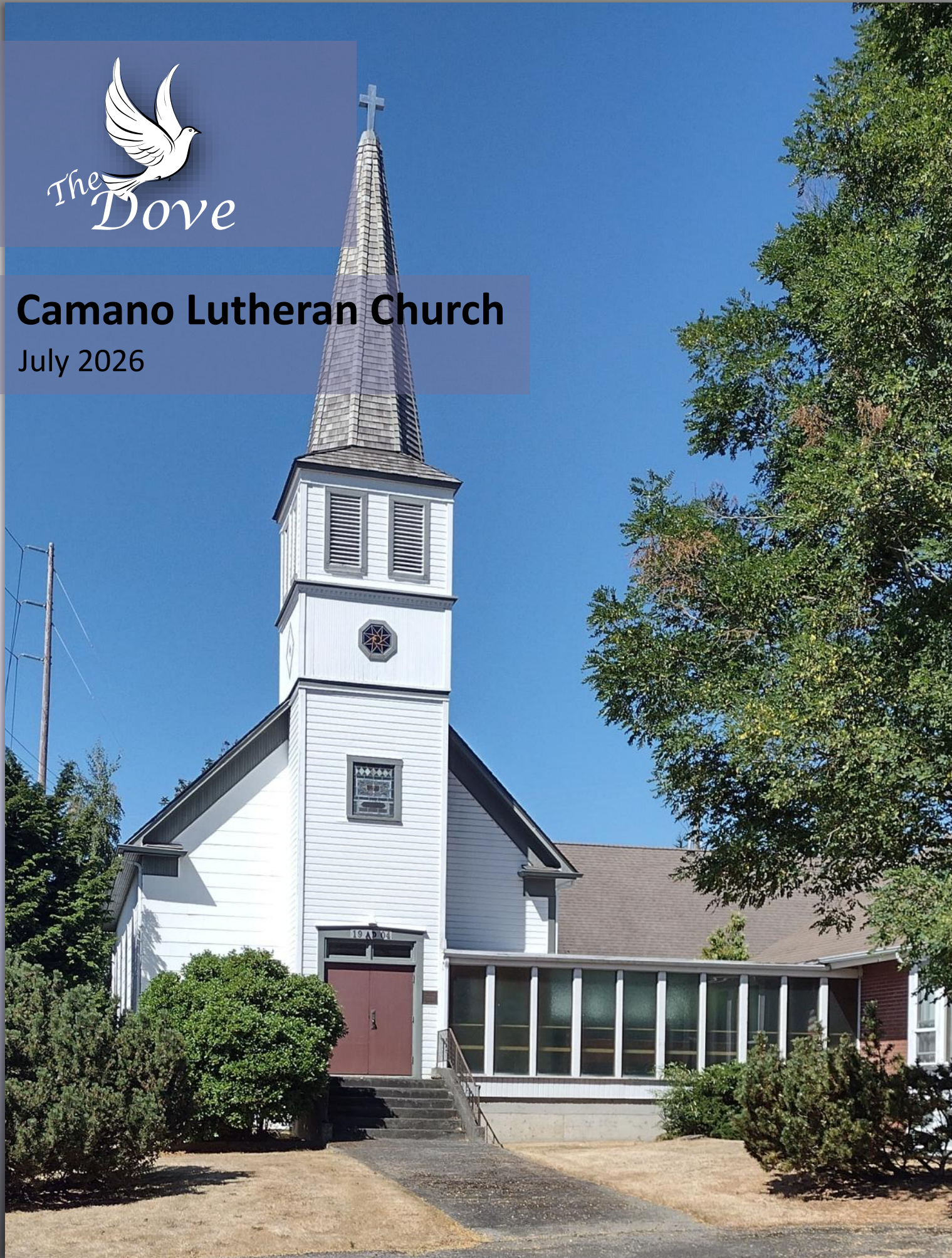

## Reflections with Pastor Scott



For those of us who live on Camano Island, we can always tell when summer is here and people are heading out for time away for refreshment in their lives. The roads fill up and visitors refuse to drive the speed limit, instead choosing to crawl along at a glacial pace looking left and right at the beauty of our island. (Can you tell I am not a fan of folks going 25mph in a 45mph zone? lol 😊) But, it's summer and a time for relaxation, so I get it. Summer is vacation time for many. Time away, time to explore and time to recharge one's batteries.

I was thinking about the theme of "Sabbatical Connection" as I was out on a walk at the state park, seeing campsites filled with people enjoying all the above and more. Refreshment is a theme that keeps popping into my head as I look toward the sabbatical. Our theme, "Sabbath connection" naturally ties into rest, renewal, and being restored rather than just stopping activity. Scripture uses a few overlapping images: Sabbath rest, "times of refreshing," waters for the weary, and God renewing strength.

Here are passages that fit especially well with a "season of refreshment" framing:

In the Torah, Sabbath is not just cessation but sanctified rest. *Exodus 31:17* describes it in striking terms:

"On the seventh day he rested and was refreshed."

That word "refreshed" is one of the clearest biblical links between Sabbath and renewal, not merely inactivity.

A broader Sabbath rhythm is grounded in *Genesis 2:2-3*, where God blesses rest itself—suggesting rest is something fruitful, not empty.

The prophets often reframe rest as restoration of the soul and land. *Isaiah 58:11* is especially aligned with a sabbatical season:

"The LORD will guide you always; he will satisfy your needs in a sun-scorched land and will strengthen your frame. You will be like a well-watered garden, like a spring whose waters never fail."

That image of a "well-watered garden" is almost a definition of spiritual refreshment.

Closely related is *Isaiah 40:31*:

“Those who hope in the **LORD** will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles...”

This is less about stopping and more about exchanged strength—your depletion for God’s renewal.



The New Testament develops the idea of inner rest in Christ.

*Matthew 11:28–29* is central:

“Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest.”

This is Sabbath language expanded into relationship—rest as received, not achieved.

Another strong “refreshment” text is *Acts 3:19*:

“...that times of refreshing may come from the Lord.”

That phrase “times of refreshing” is one of the clearest biblical expressions of a spiritual season like what you’re describing.

For ongoing renewal rather than a one-time pause, *2 Corinthians 4:16* adds:

“Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day.”

And Psalm language often captures the felt experience of sabbatical rest beautifully.

*Psalm 23:2–3* says:

“He leads me beside quiet waters, he refreshes my soul.”

Put that into a nice summary and you have a biblical design for refreshment.

- +Sabbath as *built-in rest* (Exodus 31, Genesis 2)
- +Rest as *soul restoration* (Psalm 23, Isaiah 58)
- +Strength as *renewed capacity* (Isaiah 40, 2 Corinthians 4)
- +Christ as *embodied rest* (Matthew 11)
- +Seasons as *refreshing from God* (Acts 3)

**From the Bishop:**

**July 2026**

On July 18, 1976 Pastor Nancy Winder was ordained into Word and Sacrament ministry. She was the first woman ordained in what was then the North Pacific District and the fourteenth woman ordained in the American Lutheran Church.

But Nancy and those thirteen women were not the first. We remember all the women who came before them. In scripture we remember Mary, the mother of Jesus, Elizabeth, Mary and Martha, Mary Magdalene, Phoebe, Priscilla, Junea, Lydia, and all the unnamed women including the Samaritan woman at the well who ran to proclaim what she had seen and heard, becoming the first to declare Jesus as Lord.

Along with these women in scripture, we also remember the countless women in these last 2000 years – Hildegard, Katie Luther, Argula von Grumbach, Maria Stewart, Phoebe Palmer, Catherine Booth, Margaret Wold, and so many others who were called by the Holy Spirit to preach, teach, proclaim, lead, and serve. We give thanks for the myriad of gifts that God has poured out through women for the sake of the church and the life of the world.

I am so thankful for the many women in our lives who passed on their faith to us. The women who taught Sunday School, prepared the altar, made meals, visited those who were sick, and marched against injustice. The women theologians, mystics, and writers. The women who, in countless ways, proclaimed through word and deed the good news of Jesus.

Thank you to our sisters in Christ. Thank you for the ways you have lived out your faith in every vocation. Thank you to the women who have gone before us, to the women serving today, and to the women who continue to say yes to God's call – including those called into ordained ministry.

I wonder, do you remember the first time you heard a woman preach? The first time you heard an alto or soprano voice chanting the liturgy or saying the words of institution? I remember. I was twenty years old. Seeing and hearing someone who looked like me, who had a body like mine, made the gospel come alive in a way I hadn't experienced before. Truly, it changed my life.

This is why I grieve what is happening to some of our sisters in other denominations. In recent weeks, the Southern Baptist Convention voted at its annual assembly to further restrict women from teaching, preaching, and pastoral leadership. This means women ordained ten or twenty or fifty years ago may now find their callings denied by the very churches they have faithfully served. So many women – chosen, loved, called, sent – women with fire in their bellies to preach the gospel may no longer do so. Not by God, but by their denomination. Their silencing is not only a tragedy for them; it is a tragedy for the whole Church.

So today there is an urgency to remember, celebrate, and publicly proclaim, that women are called by God. Just as the Spirit came to Mary, who sang of the mighty brought down from their thrones, just as the Spirit sent Mary Magdalene to proclaim resurrection to the apostles, just as Lydia helped birth a community of believers, the Spirit has called and continues to call women in every age.

So, in joy, thankfulness, and celebration, let us give thanks for the women of the past, present, and future who continue to proclaim, teach, lead, and serve. For, as we read in Paul's second letter to the Corinthians, "Since it is by God's mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart ... For we do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord."

from VEEP Kay:**

I am a word person. I have always had an appreciation for the power of prose, the beauty of poetry, and the wisdom of the Word. Both of my degrees are in English and I spent thirty-seven years as a Language Arts teacher. God gave me the tongue of a teacher so I could sustain the weary with a word. So, early in my first term as synod vice president, when I was asked if I wanted to write a monthly article for “The Spirit,” I happily agreed.

At first, my hope was to use the space to share more information about the role of the synod council. I knew from personal experience that the average “person in the pew” didn’t really know much about the other two expressions of the church. Therefore, the first few submissions were heavy in language from our governing documents about the responsibilities of the vice president and the rest of the council. I shared about our meetings and what I and the other council members had been up to in the month. These were informational, but not exactly “sustaining the weary” words.

As time went on, circumstances changed. We entered into an unprecedented global pandemic that upended so much of what we believed about what community and church were. We learned new ways of being neighbors at appropriately social distance and new ways of doing and being church. As synod leadership scrambled to support and assist our congregations, it became apparent that weariness was a definite challenge. My articles began to focus on scripture and a layperson’s understanding of what God was doing in the world. Every day when I took my “I just need to get out of this darn house” walk, I prayed for the words to sustain the weary. I hope those articles were uplifting and strengthening in very troubling times.

Eventually, we emerged from the pandemic shutdown, but I continued to use the space to reflect on scripture. I’m not a deacon nor a pastor. I’m not a trained theologian. My ponderings are those of a layperson. I hoped that the things I was curious about or the little epiphanies I had would also resonate with others. Interestingly, although the bishop and I never discussed what we would be writing about, our articles almost always seemed like we’d coordinated them. It seems that “The Spirit” is truly Spirit-inspired.

In this final article, I want to share what an honor it has been to serve as your synod vice president over the past eight years. As tough as leading during the pandemic and the current political turmoil has been, I have had the opportunity to meet and work with so many wonderful people, not only throughout the synod, but the entire ELCA. I have had the joy of representing the synod at call meetings and of attending ordinations and installations of rostered ministers. I have been an active participant and leader in the Association of Synod Vice Presidents and I have represented the synod at three Churchwide Assemblies. Mostly, though, I have worked with the bishop, our amazing synod staff, and all the faithful and wise members of synod council to act on behalf of all the individuals, congregations, worshipping communities, and outreach ministries striving to be God’s presence here in the NWWA Synod.

Thank you to all who have supported me these past eight years. I commend to you our new Vice President, Cindy Shultz, whose term begins August 1. I know she will be a great partner in this work. It has been my honor and privilege to serve as vice president.

**Using Airplanes... to bring the Love of Christ to the ends of the earth.**

### **Training... Mission Aviation Training Academy**

Mission Aviation Training Academy (MATA) in Arlington, WA. For 20 years MATA has trained and equipped evangelical Christian pilots for mission aviation ministry, including meeting qualifications for major mission organizations and training directly for service with smaller aviation ministries. There is a serious shortage of pilots serving in remote locations around the world, where aviation is the most practical means of transportation for church planters, Bible translators, health care workers and patients, and disaster relief efforts. MATA trains pilots to help meet the shortfall of missionary pilots in order to spread the Gospel farther and faster. It takes approximately 10 years to adequately train a pilot for aviation ministry.

Camano Lutheran Church supports David Perkins in aviation training at MATA. David is an Information Technology computer specialist that assists our church with computer needs as well. David and his wife have a heart for the isolated communities in Alaska. They serve as support missionaries to a Christian Radio station in Naknek, Alaska. David routinely travels to the remote bush to assist in technical computer management at the radio station and remote radio repeaters. He is asked to fly into villages and work on equipment as well as fly supplies, people and or pastors to church services or Christian camps. David also travels with his wife Laura to help with summer activities like children vacation bible school in isolated villages.

David is currently working on an advanced commercial aviation rating which will allow him more flexibility to assist the mission team in Alaska. Thank you for your support and prayers as he and his wife share the Love of Christ to those isolated and hurting beyond the roads in bush Alaska. Aviation is the only way to reach most of the state of Alaska. Naknek is located at the start of the Aleutian chain of islands on Bristol Bay.

# Water Confidence Report for 2025-2026

## Water Confidence Report for 2025-2026

This is an update to last year's report. Testing during the past year shows no change in the information presented in last year's report repeated below.

The purpose of this report is to update the users of Camano Lutheran Church's facilities about the current state of the water system.

The source of the water is from an underground aquifer pumped through the church's own well. The well is on the church's property. It is 96 feet deep with a capacity of 50 gallons per minute. The water is not filtered or treated because it meets the state's standards for drinking water.

King Water, now a division of Northwest Natural Water based in Portland, OR, is the contracted water management service for the church's system. It collects samples for testing for contaminants, takes them to a laboratory and provides the church and the state department of health with the results. Samples for coliform monitoring are required once a month; lead and copper once every three years; nitrates every year; manganese every three years; pesticides, fumigants and herbicides every three years. A complete inorganic sample and asbestos are on a nine year schedule because none have been detected at levels of concern. Volatile organics are on a six year schedule for the same reason.

Looking back to the most recent reports for every category, including several years of samples examined for coliform, the only exceedance of state maximum levels was manganese. Currently the state does not require treatment even at relatively high levels found in the church's well water. The state's required reporting level is .3 mg/liter. The church's tests have been as high as .42 mg/L.

Quoting the state department of health:

"Manganese is a naturally occurring mineral found in rocks, groundwater and surface water. Small amounts of manganese are essential nutrients for humans. Our bodies need some manganese to stay healthy, but too much can be harmful, especially to infants. Manganese in water can also stain laundry and create brownish-black or black stain in toilets, showers, bathtubs or sinks. Manganese can make water look, smell or taste bad. Manganese accumulates inside pipes in distribution systems and can be released in higher concentrations to the users of the water system. Research worldwide has given us a more complete understanding of how manganese interacts with drinking water systems and its human health impacts..."

The state recommends that we install a treatment/removal system. They also require that it be designed by a certified water engineer. The cost would probably be over \$60,000. For now childcare is using bottled water for drinking and cooking which is okay with the childcare licensing office. Others who use the building are also bringing in bottled water. Adults who are in the building for a short time a week and only consume a couple cups of water or coffee made with the water are not likely to ingest harmful amounts of manganese. It is recommended to run the faucets a short time before filling a container for use. Eventually the state DOH will probably issue new requirements and we will have to conform to whatever they are.



Markus Ginting is a hardworking farmer in Indonesia. His main crop is potatoes, which he used to grow the traditional way using conventional fertilizers and pesticides. Before he learned new methods, he would lose up to 40% of his crops to diseases every year — making it difficult to afford his children's school fees and other basic needs for his family.

A few years ago, everything changed when LWR taught him how to make organic fertilizers from plant waste and manure from his own farm. Today, his crops are healthier and are no longer dying from diseases at high rates. This means he can sell more potatoes for the same amount of effort. This added income, plus the money he saves by making his own fertilizers, has given his children healthy food, access to education and much greater hope for the future.
