Reflections with Pastor Scott

Hope All Around



The song below has recently captured my attention and speaks into the reality of so much of what is happening in our world. The world is filled with great pain, and many are echoing the thoughts of these questions, "Can all that is lost ever be found?" and 'Is there any hope amidst life's brokenness?" As we come out of Lent and the journey with Jesus that has taken us to Jerusalem, Jesus on trial and his death on the cross, we also draw near to celebrating God's power over death and the celebration of Christ's resurrection for all humanity. Even in the worst humanity has to offer toward another human being, God shows up to bring life where we often try and destroy life. The words of the song Beautiful Things By Michael Gungor are as follows: (I encourage you to find the song online and give it a listen first hand)

All this pain I wonder if I'll ever find my way I wonder if my life could really change at all All this earth Could all that is lost ever be found Could a garden come up from this ground at all You make beautiful things out of the dust All around Hope is springing up from this old ground Out of chaos life is being found in you You make me new, you are making me new

The song begins acknowledging the pain but moves into the hope that is ours amidst it all. The past two years have been filled with pain and death present in people's lives in a multitude of ways. It's easy to look at what we feel and see all around us or what seems to be what our intake avenues of information mostly give us and believe everything is falling apart or believe there is far

more evil than good in our world. The resurrection of Christ shows us the power of God over such evil and as the resurrected people of Christ we bear witness to the power of Christ's love over evil and death.

Stop and think of all the witnesses to God's love that are present every day. How many millions of dollars were donated yesterday to charity to meet the needs of those that are hurting? How many people were helping at a food bank or shelter yesterday? How many people listened to a hurting friend? How

many grandparents are helping their kids out by taking the grandkids to school, picking them up from school or just spending time with them building valuable relationships that last a lifetime? How many people are sending a note of encouragement to someone? The list goes on. What would you add? Really, take ten minutes and write your list.

It seems to me our information gathering avenues push us in a direction to believe there is far more evil than good in the world. The resurrection of Christ reminds us God has shown up to show us Christ love which builds up life is far more powerful and far more prevalent if we but stop and pause and look.

So, pause this Easter Season and look. Look at the empty cross. Look at your own 24/7 life. Look at your neighbor. I am willing to bet you will realize there is far more of God's love in Christ permeating this world than the evils that led to Good Friday. Easter blessings everyone.

The Bishop's Article from the March 2022 Edition of The Spirit



From the Bishop:

One of the things I love about living in the Pacific Northwest is the abundance of life. In January, the grass is green. In February, plants are blooming. In March, little flowers are pushing through soil. In April,

color bursts out everywhere. To me, these signs of life are miracles.

And don't we need some of these signs right now? I mean, there are so many places where it feels like ongoing winter - the discord and acrimony amongst families, churches, peoples, and nations. As I write this article Russia is invading Ukraine. Perhaps when you read this article, things will be different but at this moment there is bombing and shooting and fear and death. And entrenched crises continue: houselessness, racism, ableism, unjust governments, and so much more. Individually, many are experiencing physical and mental illness, fatigue, and exclusion. I remember a quote from C.S. Lewis' book The Lion, The Witch, and the Wardrobe where one of the characters says, "It is winter in Narnia, and has been for ever so long ... always winter, but never Christmas."

It has been a long winter ... perhaps even two years of winter. Pain and sorrow and death feel very close. There is grief, there is anger, there is exhaustion, and there is sadness.

And yet ... And yet ...

Gardens are full of seeds. Farmers are tilling the soil. Tulips are blooming. Rhododendrons are on their way. We see signs around us that winter is ending and the Bringer of Spring is coming.

As I travel through this synod, I see signs of new life and new hope. I see resolve and new partnerships. While there are challenges that we are all facing, while there is much work to do individually and together, I sense new possibilities.

When I meet with councils and other leaders in congregations, I am delighted that we are having good, strong, sometimes difficult conversations about things that matter. In our best moments, we are not as concerned about smaller difficulties but instead, as people of faith, we are leaning into what it means to love God and love neighbor in this time and in this place. I thank God for the opportunity for conversation, listening, and moving on the Breath of God's Spirit

The truth is, alone - we cannot create life, alone - we cannot change systems, alone - we cannot move winter into spring. But through Christ, through the One who died for this world and who is raised into new life, we can.

And so, as it is written in Paul's second letter to the Corinthians: We do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal. 2 Corinthians 16-18

We are promised that through this time, through world events, through whatever is next, Jesus is with us. And even more than that, we are promised that there is something amazing beyond all measure - more than we can know or even imagine. It is difficult to sometimes comprehend this promise – especially when we look at the destruction and pain and devastation in this world – and yet ... and yet ... we cling to the promise. As people of faith, we pray and whisper and shout it out – that through Christ's death and resurrection all things that create death will be gone. Period. Full. Stop.

And because of knowing and trusting this promise, we are then called, as beloved children of God, to see, appreciate, and tend to the small plants entrusted to us – knowing that we also are plants, also seeds, also soil, called to live into and share this new life with and for others.

May this Easter spring forth with new life for you. May you feel the hope given through Jesus. And may together we shout, "Happy Easter! Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!"

JANUARY - FEBRUARY 2022 CLC PROPERTY TEAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS

1. Adjusted closer mechanisms on several exterior doors to ensure complete engagement.

2. Erected the new Child Care information sign for highway 532 traffic. Later windy conditions required more sign adjustments to improve stability.

3. Defrosted the kitchen freezer and emptied all the leftover stale bread items that had been there since 2020.

4. Installed new flowers in planter boxes and pots in the front plaza entry area. Unfortunately, it snowed several more times later and some of the plants show signs of damage.

5. Rodents have reappeared in the "Dungeon" basement . Removed trapped remains, reset traps, and did some cleaning.

6. Did some minor telephone system repairs.

7. Treated areas with moss control where new growth made the usual spring appearance.


8. Reset the electric panel breakers for the newest stove. They are not easily visible as being tripped and will need some professional follow up.

9. A ceiling heater in the lower level of the Child Care building was not working. Purchased a new fan/heater unit and installed it. It has a low ceiling so no ladder work was necessary.




APRIL ADULT EDUCATION CLASSES



Rajendra Kushwaha and his wife Nikky Devi used to have a hard time sleeping, as they feared they'd be woken in the night by rising floodwaters that would wash away their home, gardens and livestock. It had happened several times before — the river near their home in India would swell without warning and sweep everything away, leaving their family vulnerable to hunger.

But your kindness reached them on the banks of the river. For them, your love sounds like an But your kinaness reached inem on the banks of the river, for them, your love sounds like all announcement made through a tinny megaphone, letting them know a flood is coming. This early warning system urges their entire village to take their livestock and valuables to higher ground well before the floodwaters arrive. Your love is also teaching them new farming techniques — like growing food on rooftops or in hanging baskets — so their vital crops don't wash away. Now Rajendra, Nikky and their children can rest easier at night, knowing their crops and futures are more secure

ONE PARISH ONE PRISONER (OPOP)

Several months ago, we saw a video at church made by Underground Ministries that exposed us to OPOP. This is a ministry that provides a way for someone who is incarcerated and a way to re-engage with life in the community upon release. On our way home from church that day my wife, Charlotte and my daughter, Jennifer let me know they wanted to be a part of this opportunity.

We became part of the Stillaguamish Cluster group to assist Kelly when he is released from the Walla Walla State Penitentiary on June 14th. This is no small task, since he will be leaving with the clothes on his back and nothing else.

If you have noted, his name has been on our prayer list and in the Prayers of the Church each week. We are all in for him. This article is to ask you to prayerfully consider how you would be willing to help our OPOP team which now consists of Jon Hamlin, Jennifer McFall, Charlotte Shoup, Pastor Scott and me.


The challenges that we have in front of us is to secure housing, help get a drivers permit and a drivers license, clothes, employment and a vehicle. Our Benevolence of the Month for February was OPOP. Thank you for all who contributed.

We have a good lead on possible employment since Kelly has been a painter. One way that you could be of help here is if you are needing some painting done. Jon Hamlin would be the person to contact about that.

Housing looks to be a big hurdle at a price that we/he will be able to afford. If you know of someone who might have a room to rent, a Mother in Law apartment or someone who has a trailer that could be rented or used. Please contact me, Paul Shoup – 206-914-1425.

There is also the possibility that we will need to furnish a place to live. If that is a way that you could be a part of this, we will know later what we might need. If you have a vehicle that you could contribute, it can be given to the church and then be given to Kelly.

Also, if you have a Thrivent account and have Choice Dollars, they could be contributed through Camano Lutheran Church. Other contributions can be designated for OPOP at Camano Lutheran. We hope to have him somewhat launched in about 3 to 4 months.

Josephine Caring Community

One hundred thirteen years ago, a faithful Lutheran, John Hals, donated ten acres and \$10,000 in memory of his wife, Josephine, for the founding of "Josephine Old People's Home." Since then the home has been a place where area Lutherans have, in the words of Mr. Hals, "Care[d] for others as God has provided for us."

Since that small start, the ministry has grown far beyond "old people" and in recent years has been renamed "Josephine Caring Community" in recognition of its many services. These include:

- **\$** The Meadows (Nursing Care: 117 residents)
- \$ The Suites (Senior Assisted-living: 64 residents)
- \$ Josephine at Home (newly starting home health and home care services)

- \$ Saratoga (Transitional Rehabilitation: 500 patients yearly)
- \$ Josie's Learning Center (Preschool, Kindergarten, Montessori, and ECEAP, before and after school child care: over 250 children)
- **\$** Chaplaincy Program

Josephine Caring Community is a nonprofit Social Ministry Organization affiliated with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, supported by eighteen area congregations.

Josephine Caring Community is continuing to expand its vision of caring service. Plans are underway for two independent living communities for seniors 62 and older: one in Stanwood (20 units) and the other in Smokey Point (50 units). See <u>https://www.jccexpansion.com/</u> for more information.
