Reflections with Pastor Scott Home Communion

As we move into a new year, the past comes with us.

During November and December our Care Team had training sessions on home communion. We walked through the role of the earliest deacons in the church as table servers, taking care of widows, orphans, and others in need of the basics of life, including bringing communion opportunities to them. They embraced this important ministry as the disciples "Devoted themselves to prayer and the ministry of the Word." (Acts 6)

Since returning to in person worship and post pandemic restrictions, churches all over look different then they did prior to covid. Some people returned to the worshiping community they were a part of, some left for other worshipping communities, some continue to stay home and worship online and some completely left involvement in a local church. In talking with other pastors and church attenders from various churches, it hasn't always been easy to determine which category those who haven't returned find themselves.

Our Care Team played an important role in trying to keep people connected during the pandemic. Calls were made, notes sent, zoom gatherings offered among other opportunities to connect. That same heart of caring is present with our Care Team now as we have moved into a new phase of life as a world and a church. Part of that heart of caring will be to offer home communion to those who are unable to come to church. This isn't to replace what pastor already does with visits and communion, but in addition to it. Once a month at the end of worship we will invite our Care Team home communion members to come forward, receive the elements from worship and offer a sending prayer as they carry the communion elements and worshiping community to those unable to attend worship. This is a wonderful extension of the worshiping community. Even though one may not be able to attend worship in person, you are not forgotten and, in this way, will be connected to those who gathered on Sunday morning.

As we begin this new gift of ministry we are asking for your help. If you are one who would like us to come bring communion to you or if you know someone that might be interested, please let us know. The Bishop's Article from the January 2023 Edition of The Spirit



From the Bishop:

More than twenty years ago now, when I was serving in a congregation, I sat with a woman who was dying. I loved this woman. Her name was Bobbie. She was fierce and funny. She was smart. She could

be a little intimidating. She was a tall, big woman who pounded her cane into the ground as she walked. Throughout her life, like most people, she knew grief and joy. Disappointment and surprise. I was honored to hold her hand and sit with her as she took her last breaths.

As pastor, I have had the opportunity to sit with many people as they are dying. It is one of the most holy things a person can do. There is truly a thinness between what is and what is to come. While there are many things I love and miss as a congregational pastor, one of the top absences is being invited into people's lives as they leave this world and enter into God's presence in the company of all the saints.

Recently I attended a three-day retreat with several bishops and leaders from the western part of the United States. Most of what we talked about and discerned was what it means to be church today. Included in the conversation was how to journey and accompany congregations that are dying. This retreat wasn't a "how-to manual" of what to do. Instead, the intentional prayer, singing, worship, and community led us to sit in the same "thinness" feeling that I mentioned above: what is and what is to come.

As we sat in both the grief of some of our congregations closing and in the anticipation of what God is calling us towards, one person made the comment, "There is Spirit-led death and then there is just death." I've been pondering about this statement since it was said. What does it mean to have a Spirit-led death? What does it mean to just die?

Perhaps we can use Bobbie's death as a guide.

I think back to Bobbie who I met with many times before she died. She made it clear to me what her wishes were for her funeral. She talked many times about how thrilled she would be to see her husband again. (Her husband died when he was twenty-eight leaving her with two small sons.) She was looking forward to resting. She wanted to make sure that I knew how glad she was to not be a burden any more to her sons. She had hopes for the assets she was leaving behind and how they would be used to further her passions. Most of all, she was excited about what was next for her – she talked quite frequently about the questions she was ready to ask Jesus.

In the weeks before Bobbie died, her sons called me to ask if I would be available to sit with Bobbie when she died. They lived far away and knew that they might not make it to her bedside in time. I, of course, said yes. When the nurse called me, I went.

In Bobbie's last hours on earth, I was with her. I felt God's holy presence as I held her hand, sang hymns, prayed the Lord's prayer, shed tears, sat in silence, loved her, and was present with her and Jesus in the thin place between life and death and resurrection.

Going back to the retreat that I was at and the questions that arose, I wonder how we can have language to talk about some congregations having Spirit-led deaths. While I hope and pray that all congregations thrive and grow, I also know that there is a life cycle for all things. And I want to be able to live in the thinness between life and death and resurrection with all of us in the Northwest Washington Synod. I want to have the hard, deep conversations that need to happen. I want us to talk about looking beyond survival and instead talk about death and resurrection. How can we do this in meaningful ways? How can we do this before there is a sudden death? How can we do this acknowledging the pain and heartache and also living in faith and hope?

We in the synod office want to journey with you in these conversations. It is not easy and it is not wanted. But it is a time that can be holy and where God's presence is made known.

As this new year begins, may we walk together in the Spirit – placing our hope in God through Jesus. May we journey as resurrection people.

NOVEMBER 2022 CLC PROPERTY TEAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- 1. Removed mounds of yard waste debris from along west side of the Pioneer Hall kitchen, uncovering vent openings. This is part of a project for covering the vents with rodent proof barriers.
- 2. Contacted our electrician to repair one ceiling heater in lower Child Care building.
- 3. Storm damage caused long term power loss at CLC, when one phase of our three phase power was damaged and impacted heat in the larger sanctuary.
- 4. Spoiled contents of the kitchen freezer resulting from electrical outage were dumped.
- 5. Worked with technician responding to one of our three heat pump outages.
- 6. Repaired one of the long tables. Damage appeared to be from rough usage and poor design.
- 7. Took garlands from attic down to main floor for decoration use.
- 8. Repaired Day Care road-side sign that was suffering from wind damage. A more long term solution is still needed here.
- 9. The stage was reassembled and set up for the Preschool program use.
- 10. Worked with another HVAC technician for repairing one of our heat pumps. The problem continued into December.
- 11. Worked with our regular electrician to reset GFI outlets in Fellowship Hall.

Housing Hope

Housing Hope: A local response to a community need.

The North Snohomish County Council of Churches formed a task force in 1987 to look for ways to address the immediate homeless crisis and proposed the formation of a nonprofit agency with the expertise to leverage community resources for real housing solutions. They incorporated Housing Hope on September 30, 1987 and envisioned it as a housing development corporation.

Mission Statement: Housing Hope shall promote and provide affordable housing and tailored services to reduce homelessness and poverty for residents of Snohomish County and Camano Island.

Housing Hope offers a full range of housing solutions:

- Emergency shelter for up to 90 days
- Homeless housing with access to voluntary services
- Permanent, affordable rental housing
- Opportunities for home ownership

As well as social support programs:

- Case Management
- Employment Services
- Adult Education Program
- Credit and Homeownership Counseling
- Child Development Program
- Teen Parent Program

An example of some of what was done between July 2020 and June 2021:

<u>Emergency Shelter</u>: 52 children and parents from 19 families moved from living on the streets to having safe housing in Emergency Shelter where they could focus on finding stable and affordable housing.

<u>Service-Supported Housing</u>: 287 households, comprised of 684 family members, received service-supported housing.

<u>Child Development Services</u>: 223 children and parents from 81 families received child development services from Tomorrow's Hope Child Development Center.

Thank you for your recent gift of \$58.00 to Lutheran World Relief given through the Northwest Washington Synod of the ELCA. I'd like to share a story with you about how your support makes a real difference.

Guisela is a single mother living with her two daughtesr in the remote hills of western Guatemala. Without a regular source of income or the knowledge to work the dry, lifeless land, she struggled to provide a daily meal for her children. She made long daily treks to fetch clean water for her family, hauling heavy containers back up steep terain to her home. This time-consuming effort left little time for gardening, and with little farming know-how, she often paid the high cost of transportation to buy vegetables for her children at the nearest market. Since job prospects for women in this area are few and far between, earning money was difficult. The cycle of poverty seemed impossible for Guisela to break.

But your love changed everything. Your generosity is delivering seeds, tools and mentorship. Because of you, Guisela has learned to farm and now has an abundance of healthy and nutritious food to offer her growing children.




