Reflections with Pastor Scott

We Create Exclusion or Belonging



Last Months article was written by Terry Kylo focused on bringing people together from different walks of life. This connected to an earlier sermon where I Mentioned how important it is to learn other people's stories.

If we are not willing to learn other people's stories, the easy thing to do is exclude and we see too much of that today and we have seen too much of it in the Christian church over the years. This month I am sharing and article from Richard Rohr on how exclusion can happen and what it does to us. I hope it inspires some thought, repentance and hope.

We Create Exclusion or Belonging

Richard Rohr describes how exclusion works. Everything does not belong when people and systems project their evil elsewhere:

If our egos are still in charge, we will find a "disposable" person or group on which to project our problems. People who haven't come to at least a minimal awareness of their own shadow side will always find someone else to hate, fear, and exclude. Hatred holds a group together much more quickly and easily than love and inclusivity, I am sorry to say. [1]

Sadly, the history of violence and the history of religion are almost the same history. When religion remains at an immature level, it tends to create very violent people who ensconce themselves on the side of the good, the worthy, the pure, the saved. They project all their evil somewhere else and attack it over there. [2]

Something has to be sacrificed. Blood has to be shed. Someone has to be blamed, attacked, tortured, imprisoned, or killed. Sacrificial systems create religions and governments of exclusion and violence. Yet Jesus taught and modeled inclusivity and forgiveness!

As long as we try to deal with evil by some other means than forgiveness, we will never experience the real meaning of evil and sin. We will keep projecting, fearing, and attacking it over there, instead of "gazing" on it within ourselves and weeping over it.

The longer we gaze, the more we will see our own complicity *in* and profitability *from* the sin of others, even if it's the satisfaction of feeling we are on higher moral ground. Forgiveness demands three new simultaneous "seeings": I must see God in the other, I must access God in myself, and I must experience God in a new way that is larger than an "Enforcer." [3]



Author Cole Arthur Riley, creator of Black Liturgies, considers the toll that exclusion takes:

Exclusion operates by the same rule of mutuality as welcome, for it harms both the excluded and the excluder. If you are the hands of exclusion for long enough, you learn acceptance only at the hands of someone else's exile. You learn belonging as competition, not restoration. It is also a kind of restlessness, for the energy you expend forbidding others to walk through the door of community is only matched by the energy you expend competing to stay inside yourself. This is maybe more dangerous; no one ever perceives the doorkeeper as needing an invitation themselves....

I wonder if God feels as alienated from us as we do from [God]. Sometimes, it cracks me up to think of the stories that describe Christ just boldly inviting himself over to people's houses for dinner. Roaming around telling people to stop everything and follow him. Multiplying food, but making everyone sit down in groups to eat it. He knew how to make his own belonging. Do we? [4]

Doctors Without Borders

Who Are They?

In May 1968, a group of young doctors decided to go and help victims of wars and major disasters. They were to become Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF), known internationally in English as Doctors Without Borders. The organization was created on the belief that all people have the right to medical care regardless of gender, race, religion, creed, or political affiliation, and that the needs of these people outweigh respect for national boundaries.

What Do They Do?

Doctors Without Borders was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1999. The judges chose them "in recognition of the organization's pioneering humanitarian work on several continents" and to honor their medical staff, who had worked in more than 80 countries and treated tens of millions of people.

Doctors Without Borders has developed and produced pre-packaged disaster kits ready for transport within hours, including a complete surgical theatre the size of a small conference table and an obstetrics kit the size of a two-drawer file. The pre-packaged disaster kits are already custom-cleared and ready for flight. Planes can be loaded and flown into crisis areas within 24 hours.

The war in Ukraine is driving enormous medical needs and disrupting people's access to urgently needed health care. Teams of Doctors Without Borders provide medical and humanitarian aid to various parts of the country, including war torn areas in southern and eastern Ukraine.

Doctors Without Borders emergency medical teams were mobilized around the world in response to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. They responded on multiple fronts—caring for patients, offering health education and mental health support, and providing training for vital infection control measures in health facilities.

Because they are independently funded by donors, they do not need to wait for institutional or government funds to be released or for a crisis to make headlines. They can immediately act where and when the need is greatest.

They rarely take funds from governments, businesses or institutions. Instead they rely mainly on the generosity of individual donors. Over 90 percent of their income comes from private donors giving small amounts. Approximately 85% of donations go directly to their programs, with 14% used for fundraising and 1% for management & general.

Without a regular source of income or the knowledge to work the dry, lifeless land, she struggled to provide a daily meal for her children. She made long daily treks to fetch clean water for her family, hauting heavy containers back up steep termin to her home. This time-consuming effort left little time for gardening, and with little farming know-how, she often paid the high cost of transportation to buy vegetables for her children at the nearest market. Since job prospects for women in this area are few and far between, earning money was difficult. The cycle of poverty seemed impossible for Guisela to break.

Most of my training flights in the USA were not conducive to having passengers, and for the past 15 years, we've been half a world apart.
